

PARIS GOES WILD IN WELCOMING KRUGER

Recieved as a Sovereign By President Loubet.

ARMED GUARDS LINED THE STREETS

EVERY PRECAUTION TAKEN TO PREVENT AN ANTI-ENGLISH OUTBREAK.

Aged Boer Sounds French Government as to its Attitude in Certain Eventualities—Does Not Hope For Aid From America.

PARIS, November 24.—The city of Paris welcomed Mr. Kruger today in a whole-hearted manner, according to him a sincere reception at the station, and showing by the cheering of the crowds all along the route that he was cordially welcome and had the sympathy of the populace.

After the reception ceremonies at the station Mr. Kruger entered a four-horse landau and was at once driven to his hotel, amid enthusiastic cheering, which followed him along the whole route.

At 4 o'clock a landau from the Elysee Palace was driven to the Hotel Scribe, and Mr. Kruger, his interpreter and M. Crozier proceeded to the Elysee, escorted by a strong detachment of Cuirassiers.

Wants to Know of France.

PARIS, Nov. 23.—The conversation which former President Kruger had with the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, M. Delcasse, yesterday, was confined to the former sounding the alarm in certain eventualities.

Mr. Kruger today drove to the school of Fine Arts to inspect the plaster model of the monument to be erected to the memory of Col. Deville Bois-Mareuil, the French officer who died in South Africa fighting for the Boers.
