TRANSPORTATION WAS THE LEADING TOPIC

Bids Will Be Called For the Molokai Service.

WILDER'S STEAMSHIP CO. RELENTS

THE BOARD OF HEALTH ADOPTS RESOLUTION COMMENDING DOCTOR COFER.

Scarlet Fever on Island of Hawaii—Davies Corporation Has Been Awarded Tinned Meat Contract—The Plague in China.

Transportation was the principal matter before the weekly meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon. On the report of a committee it was decided to call for bids for the Molokai carrying service. In the meantime Wilder's Steamship Co. has relented from its insistence on cash for fares.

Those present at the meeting were: Dr. H. C. Sloggett, president, Attorney General E. P. Dole, Fred. C. Smith, E. A. Mott-Smith, Dr. Moore and Wm. Auld, members; J. S. B. Pratt, the executive officer; C. B. Reynolds, superintendent of the leper settlement; C. Charlock, secretary, and C. H. Tracy, city sanitary officer.

It was reported that twelve lepers awaited passage to Molokai.

The contract for tinned fresh meats was awarded to T. H. Davies & Co., Ltd.

The Transportation Report.

The special committee on transportation presented a report, which was adopted. Following its presentation came a letter from Wilder's Steamship Co. suspending its recently made rule of not accepting treasury warrants, but only cash, for fares to Molokai. This action of the company was gratefully received and the thanks of the Board therefor were ordered to be conveyed. The committee's report is here given:

Honolulu, T. H., Aug. 6, 1901. H. C. Sloggett, M. D., President Board of Health.

Sir:—Your committee appointed to investigate the matter of subsidy and transportation of freight beg to report as follows:

The "freight and passenger guarantee for weekly common carrier service" between Honolulu and several island ports does not benefit or concern the Board in any way, as none of the leper ports on Molokai are mentioned in the appropriation. We do not understand why the appropriation was placed under this department, however we would recommend that tenders be asked for at once in order that the people at the ports called for may receive continued communication with Honolulu.

After an interview with Mr. Wright of the Wilder S. S. Co., he agreed to withdraw the letter of July by which the Board was notified that in future warrants would not be accepted in payment of fares of passengers.

In the matter of transportation of freight we would recommend that the monthly subsidy of \$200 now paid by the Board from the appropriation of "Segregation, Support and Treatment of Lepers," be withdrawn, and that tenders be called for as follows:

1st. Rate per ton for transportation of all freight for the Board of Health including packages for the lepers, if accompanied by a permit from an officer of the Board, between Honolulu and Settlement.

2nd. Transportation of lepers or an agent of the Board between Honolulu and Settlement.

3rd. Rate per head for transportation of cattle from Hawaii or Maui ports to Settlement (Waikolu).

4th. Rate per bundle for transportation of palai from ports on windward side of Molokai to Settlement.

Bids to state frequency of trips and how direct a service will be given.

Dr. Cofer Commended.

On motion of the president, seconded by the attorney general, the following resolution was carried unanimously:

"Gentlemen:—I desire to submit a resolution for your consideration and action.

"I would say by way of preface that with bubonic plague knocking at our very doors and increasing rapidly in Hongkong and throughout the Orient, and threatening to become established among us again by the introduction of infection on the incoming oriental steamers, we are certainly under deep obligations to Dr. Cofer for his unflinching courtesy, kindly consideration and the desire he has shown at all times to co-operate with this Board and its officers in the efforts to protect the health of the public during this trying time.

"In view also of the intimate relations established by usage and law between the local Health Department and the U. S. Marine Hospital Service this Board of Health and the community at large are to be congratulated on having at the head of the Marine Hospital Service so energetic and thoroughly efficient an officer as Dr. Cofer has proved himself to be on all occasions.

"I would therefore move that the Secretary be instructed to write Dr. Cofer thanking him in the name of the Board of Health for the courtesy, consideration and desire he has always shown to work and co-operate with the Board and its officers. And that we also desire to express the utmost confidence in him, and in the thorough and efficient measures which as the head of the Federal Maritime Service, he has taken, and will still continue to take for the protection of this community, and that the Secretary be also instructed to forward a copy of his resolution to Surgeon General Wyman and to Dr. Cofer."

Routine Business.

The Board had previously voted a salary of \$100 a month to Mr. Waiaman, assistant superintendent of the leper settlement. It had since been found that he was already receiving \$25 a month from the police department, so that the combined salaries would aggregate more than the law allowed. Therefore, it was now decided to reduce the stipend from the Board to \$90 a month.

The new commissions of agents of the Board were approved. They include all the chief office officials of the Board, the sheriffs and deputy sheriffs and certain civilians previously holding the commission.

Dr. Cofer's report on pestilence in the Orient was read, showing 109 plague cases in Hongkong for the two weeks ending July 23, also the outbreak of plague in Amoy.

Permission was granted Ernest Freitas, having work to do at the Bishop Home, to land at the settlement.

An arrangement was authorized for furnishing the denizens of the settlement with stamped envelopes in lieu of the franking privileges they enjoyed under the former Hawaiian government.

Dr. Archer Irwin, government physician for North Hilo, notified the Board of scarlet fever in the Japanese labor camp at Hakalau, stating that strict quarantine had been instituted.

A formal vote was passed rescinding the regulation for burning garbage at Kakaako, in conformity with the change of site for that service to Iwilei.

The reports of the city sanitary officer, the sanitary inspectors and the plumbing inspector were received and accepted.

SANITARY INSPECTION.

Work of Inspectors in All City Districts Summarized.

Following is a summary of the reports of the sanitary inspectors of Honolulu for July:

J. L. Wheeler, District No. 1, from July 15 to 31. Gave 627 orders, saw 462 carried out. Total inspections, 591.

A. G. Hitchcock, District No. 2. Gave 341 orders, the work being finished in 338 cases. Total inspections, 2009.

N. P. Jacobson, District No. 3. Gave 772 orders; work finished, 584. Total inspections, 1789.

Vivichaves, District No. 4. Ordered work done in 438 cases, and saw it finished in 324 cases. Total inspections, 1102.

Carroll, District No. 5. Ordered, 1840; finished, 1144. Total inspections, 2084.

J. W. Francis, District No. 6. Ordered, 619; finished, 617. Total inspections, 1853.

All except the first are for the whole month.
