PRESUMPTION.

It is with reluctance that we have to take exception to certain apparent improprieties in a semi-editorial news article in yesterday's Advertiser. But they having been pointed out to us by a number of persons, without anything to show that the expressions of dissent were other than individually spontaneous, the matter cannot be passed over without comment. The article in question is that describing the preparations for and the departure of the relief expedition to Ocean Island, also giving an account of the wreck of the United States steamship Saginaw in 1870. With regard to the latter, inaccuracies were committed which we have deemed it best to correct in the main by giving an account of the event from authentic records of the time in question. The statement that the Saginaw was wrecked through the ignorance of the officers in charge of her, is indignantly resented in quarters where that was to be expected on an unjust reflection of the kind being passed upon American nava officers. That the vessel was run ashore on a bright day is contradicted in our sources of information, which give the early hour of 2:45 in the morning for the occurrence. As the narrative, where the statement herein questioned appears, gives the same date for the arrival of five survivors on Kauai, as the date on which the wreck undoubtedly happened, the 29th of October, 1870, it is not improbable that our contemporary has been misled by some very erroneous report of the event. Gentlemen who were well acquainted with Captain Sicard inform us that he was a very capable officer and a man of excellent parts. As, however, we have no idea that our contemporary wilfully traduced the reputation of the Saginaw's officers, but was simply led astray by inaccurate or prejudiced accounts, that portion of the article referred to may be dismissed without further criticism.

With regard to our contemporary's report of the relief expedition to the shipwrecked company of the Duntottar Castle, there are improprieties falling under the head of this article which are not so easy to be explained. Apparently the impression is sought to be conveyed that, without the interposition of the Hawaiian Government, the relief expedition would have been very inadequately equipped. "Supplies were put aboard by representatives of the Hawaiian and British Government," reads the account, which, giving the Government that sent the expedition secondary mention, has a very presumptuous and offensive sound. That is the way it is taken in this community, our contemporary is assured. We do not know how the representatives of Her Britannic Majesty regard it, but the representative of another European Power has spoken to the writer in other than indifferent tones about the prominence with which the Hawaiian Government is thrust forward in a matter wherein it was only permitted by courtesy to have a part. Doubtless the Hawaiian Government is entitled to much praise for so readily embracing the opportunity provided by the representative of England, to send means of averting distress in the future to shipwrecked people on Ocean Island. The organ of the Government has decidedly overslipped its functions for the sake of catching a great slice of reputation abroad. It exceeds the bounds of propriety a long way to give the Hawaiian Government the chief prominence in an enterprise to which it only contributes a small, supplementary, and not indispensable amount of assistance.


NOTES.
