The annual reunion of members of the Grand Army of the Republic, to which the name of "Camp Fire" has been given, ought to be an honored event wherever a Post of that organization is in existence. Here the institution of a Post has some features of peculiar significance. It is in a foreign country. It is a foreign body in the midst of foreigners from almost every natio 1 under the sun. Whatever, therefore, is in it to inspire a noble patriotism should have a reflex influence not only on residents of American citizenship, but on the citizens of this country and aliens other than Americans. A pathetic feature, common to all Grand Army Posts, and, for that matter, to the veterans of any war, was well brought out on Saturday evening. "When the fountain is dried up, there is no further supply.' The Grand Army dies with its members. Its banner, unlike that of a corps in a regular army, may not be carried into battle by successors of the veterans who inscribed it with the record of glorious achievements. But there is left the example of a citizen soldiery, who suddenly gave up peaceful pursuits to do an immortal service of arms for their country, and having done it returned to their homes and quietly resimed the arts of peace. That example will forever be a tower of strength to the Great Republic.

### LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

On Friday morning the bill to amend the Sunday law was amended and passed to third reading. The bill for preventing collisions at sea, an international law, was passed to third reading on the favorable report of the Commerce Committee. A warm debate occurred on the bill to provide for the keeping of all Government accounts in Hawaiian and English. It was supported by Messrs. Kaunamano, Keau and Kaulukou, and opposed by Messrs. Brown, Dickey, Bishop, Thurston, Gibson, Nahinu and Lilikalani. A motion for indefinite postponement was lost on the following division: For-Creighton, Bishop, Wilder, Bush, Parker, Lilikalani, Brown, Wight, Nahinu, Richardson, Castle, Dickey, Thurston and Palohou, 14. Against—Gibson, Kanoa, Kuihelani, Kaae, Keau, Baker, Amare, Kaulia, Kaulukou, Pahia, Kaunamano, Nahale, Aholo, Kaukau, Kaai, Pacheole and Kauai, 17. On motion of Mr. Gibson, the bill was referred to a select committee.

In the afternoon the house adjourned early, but not before despatching a large amount of business. The following bills were passed on second read ing: To prevent the serving of adulter ated coffee in hotels, restaurants, etc.; to prevent the payment of salary to any Government officer during his absence to parents sending children to English schools.
