LOCAL NEWS.

The lepers on Molokai pay no more taxes.

Mr. Lyons has a cash sale this morning.

There will be music at the Yosemite rink to-night.

There are 110 boarders in the Kawahalo Female Seminary.

Hoodlums are said to infest Nuuanu avenue and prey on Chinese passengers.

The British bark W. H. Watson from Liverpool may be looked for any time now.

The brigantine Claus Spreckels will probably take a mail for San Francisco to-morrow.

The Pacific Hardware Company meets in quarterly session on Saturday at 10 o'clock.

The fag end of the Corporation bills, provided for at the late session, amounts to \$22,867.72.

The new crop of strawberries has already reached the sherpets at the ice cream rooms.

The Honolulu Rifles mustered well and had satisfactory drill under Capt. Ashford last night.

Prof. Yandley particularly desires a full muster of the Fort street Church choir at seven this evening.

The trial of Thomas McGiffin for the theft of \$800 comes up in the Police Court this morning.

The Boy's Reading Room Association meets at 7:30 this evening in the Pacific Hose Company's Hall.

There was a report late last evening of a vessel off port firing rockets, but there proved to be nothing in it.

It has rained hard every night for a week or so, keeping dry during the day—a very accommodating rainy season.

Mr. Junius Kaae, member of the House of Nobles, has been appointed Registrar of Conveyances in place of Mr. Thomas Brown, deceased.

The steamer Kilauoa Hou arrived at ten o'clock last night from the Hamakua coast, and went to the cattle pens to discharge a load of cattle.

Fanning's Island is going to be fenced in, apparently, for the Star of Devon took 200 redwood posts and 200 feet of lumber for there yesterday.

Two young men were knocked off their horses, and one of them badly bruised, by a brake driven without lights, on the Palama road the other night.

Bad weather defeated the first attempt to form a Ladies' Relief Association in connection with the G. A. R. Another meeting will be held on the 26th of November.

The frame of a lanai, 300 feet long, extending from the Palace front to King street gate, has been erected by Mr. Bertelman. It is for the state lanai of the jubilee festivities.

Agents to take acknowledgments to contracts have been appointed as follows: S. K. Mahoe, Wailua, Oahu; G. O. Kamaoaha, North Kohala, Hawaii; W. S. Maule, Wailuku, Maui.

The Honokaa Sugar Company has a meeting at ten to-morrow, at the office of Messrs. F. A. Schaefer & Co. At two in the afternoon the stockholders of the Pacific Sugar Mill meet at the same place.

Dr. Craddock has been sent by the Government to look after the health of North and South Kona, Hawaii. The people must need a doctor badly there, since Hon. D. H. Nahinu's return home with an account of the doings of the session.

At Chambers on Tuesday, Judges McCully and Preston ordered that an attorney's license be granted to Samuel F. Chillingworth for the Police and District Courts, and that William J. Wright pass a further examination in one year.

The Nordberg divorce, mentioned yesterday, was granted for extreme cruelty and habitual drunkenness on the husband's part, and the custody of the child was given to the plaintiff wife. Hiihila was granted a divorce from her husband Kauanui on the ground of his desertion.

The Bulletin Hansard is out, making a volume of 744 pages including a table of contents. It is a revised republication of the fullest report of proceedings made at last session. Being the first enterprise of this kind in the Kingdom, this Hansard possesses peculiar interest and value. Price \$3.

SUPREME COURT.

October Term. The Court opened at 10 a. m., Justice Preston presiding. It adjourned at 3:35 for the day.

In the case of the King vs. Chin Quai Sei, perjury second degree, it was stipulated in open Court that the presentation of indictment and further proceedings stand over till the January term.

Hiiawe vs. Kalua and others, ejectment. The demurrer to amended complaint having been submitted without argument, the Court files a decision ordering the demurrer over-ruled and judgment for plaintiff.

Ah Hoy vs. Asa Kaula and others, trespass; jury waived. In this case, heard on the 21st inst., the Court files a decision ordering judgment for plaintiff for \$100.

The appeals regarding the widening of Fort street came up on that of H. Bradley. It was stipulated that the case be heard on the points of law by the Court, damages to be considered hereafter; other appeals in this matter to abide the decision therein. Heard, argued and submitted. Mr. Antonio Rosa appeared for the Hawaiian Government; Messrs. Whiting, Creighton and Brown for the appellant. The other appeals mentioned are those of M. McNerny (two), E. O. Hall & Son and J. W. Austin.

The Admiralty Case.

Yesterday morning, in the admiralty suit of the Pacific Navigation Company against Allen & Robinson, the testimony of experts was given on behalf of libellants. Capt. Babcock, Hon. S. G. Wilder, and Capt. Olfman, of the bark Pacific, gave evidence as to the requisite qualifications and the duties of lookouts. Mr. A. F. Cooke, President of the Pacific Navigation Company, and Mr. Fred. Wundenberg, who was the original owner of the steamer Jas. I. Dowsett, testified as to the value of the vessel, and Mr. Williams, of the Risdon Iron Works, San Francisco, as to the value of her machinery.

At two in the afternoon the respondents put on their first witness, Kuanoani, first mate of the colliding schooner Moiwahine. His examination in chief lasted an hour, and then Mr. Neumann began a raking fore and aft cross-examination, keeping it up for another hour. This witness's evidence was to the effect that the schooner's lights were burning and well attended to.

Probate Cases.

Before Justice McCully. Estate of Unea (k), deceased. The application of Mu (k), for probate of will, was heard and granted.

Estate of J. P. Paona. Petition of T. C. Polikapa for letters of administration. Ordered that L. A. Thurston be appointed administrator under a \$1,000 bond, and the costs of administration to be paid by the estate. A. P. Peterson for petitioner, L. A. Thurston for guardian and others.

Estate of Manne (w), deceased. Application of Kanianoole (k) for proof of will. Ordered that the will be admitted to probate. A. P. Peterson for petitioner.

Law Division.

Before Justice McCully, at Chambers. Estate of J. P. Amaral, a bankrupt. Petition of Jona. Austin, assignee, for discharge was granted and his bond ordered to be cancelled.

Dollar Certificates.

The United States Treasurer has issued the following notice in regard to \$1 silver certificates:

Owing to the great demand the Treasurer of the United States is unable to supply \$1 notes, except in small amounts. In order to satisfy as far as possible the public demand, it has been decided to furnish from this office those notes in sums of \$1,000 to each bank making application, and at the same time depositing that sum with the Assistant Treasurer at New York.

Upon receipt of a certificate of deposit a like sum will be forwarded at the expense of the banks making the application. The maximum amounts of these certificates that the Treasurer can furnish daily will not exceed \$80,000.

Harvard Sued for Damages.

Francis R. Brook of Chicago, formerly a student at Harvard College, has commenced suit against the college to recover \$50,000 damages. Brooks was engaged in performing an experiment in the chemical laboratory, when a retort containing sulphuric acid which he was using, exploded and he was terribly burned. One of his eyelids was burned off and his face was otherwise mutilated and torn, the disfigurements being permanent. It is claimed by the plaintiff that the experiment was being performed under the direction of a Professor, and that he supposed he was working in safety, and that through the carelessness of the Professor in charge the accident occurred.

The Billiard Match.

The forfeit for the match between McCleery and Saylor to-morrow evening has been increased from \$100 to \$400. Half of it was put up by both sides yesterday, the balance to be forthcoming before the game starts.

Under the balk line rules, that govern the approaching match, the play is very much more difficult than when "nursing" by the rail is allowed. An expert says that a game of 500 points, balk line, involves as much labor and skill as one of 2,500 such as the last two matches between the rival champions.

A line is drawn eight inches from the cushion on all sides, and the two object balls are not allowed to be within that line, both at the same time, for more than one shot. There may be a second shot at the balls in that position, but unless the second one drives one of the object balls outside the line it is not counted, and the player gives way to his opponent.

From this great difference of game, the match of to-morrow night will bring out the skill of the champions in an almost wholly new light from that of the preceding matches.

"Kapu"

During the late protracted legislative session the short cut diagonally over the grass on the Queen street side of the Government yard was worn into a well-defined path. The sign "Kapu" has now been put up at the end of the path near the building. There should be one at the opposite end, for it is too late to forbid a person to keep off the grass after he has walked over it. The sign being only in native is rather a compliment to those who do not understand that language, implying that they all should have sense enough to keep in the regular paths and off the grass without being told. However, the grounds ought to be laid out so as to have paths in the most direct line from all the gates to the doors of the building.

A Nuisance.

A horse was tied last night in a recess beside the lower end of Fort street. Two men going down to the wharf ran against the brute before they saw it. One of them struck the animal with his cane, which made it jump out on the street. This stretched the rope across the path, and the other man getting tangled in it was menaced with the hoofs of the now plunging horse, besides having his clothes splattered from the muddy rope. It is about time this practice of tying horses on the sidewalk was stopped. The city is getting rather too stately for these frontier village ways.

Police Court.

Kale was fined \$6 for drunkenness. Wm. Burk and Wm. Horspool were tried for assault and battery on Antonio Freitas. It appears that some bad blood between defendants with others and complainant with some of his Portuguese countrymen culminated in a little muss on Tuesday night. Defendants were discharged, Burk being reprimanded.

Object to Socialists.

The Manhattan Club of New York is composed of wealthy Democrats. A young member, Willard Brown, who had met the Socialists Avelin and Liebknecht in London, introduced them to the club and secured them 10 day visiting cards. Several club governors saw the Socialists there and their cards were revoked. The affair has created a decided sensation in club circles.

The Bulletin says: The name of the plant found in abundance at Ocean Island, is, according to Professor Alexander, Naupaka, or botanically, Scaevola Gaudichaudii. Aspirants to the governorship will want to know if it is good to eat. From the latter part of the name it would seem to be good in-chowder.

The "aerial boats" on Merchant street are not going to start, because the owners will not risk five dollars a night for a license. The whirling on Queen street was going last night, with its fearful hurdy gurdy accompaniment.

When Prince Alexander of Battenberg asked the advice of Bismarck about accepting the offer of the Bulgarian throne, the answer he received was: "Take it, certainly; it will be a pleasant reminiscence."

The duty on alcohol for medicinal, mechanical or scientific purposes is hereafter to be three dollars per gallon, according to an act of last session just published.

Justice Preston will hear divorce cases at Term to-day. The calendar is pretty nearly through.

Two charges of "drunk" were all the entries on the slate up till one o'clock this morning.

A playing troupe of some kind is said to be coming on Saturday's steamer.

Sherman on Silver.

Senator Sherman, in the course of a brief speech to the Cincinnati Chamber of Commerce, said: "But the greatest question of all, perhaps, is the silver question, how to make it equal to the gold dollar, for there should only be one standard. I have gone through one press or redeeming Uncle Sam's money, and I do not want to go through it again. You might have put more silver in your dollar and made it equal to gold, but then it would be too big, as it is now; but anyway it would be a good thing to go to work with. A dollar must be a dollar, and a dollar's worth of silver must be put into it to make it a dollar. That is honesty and prudence. If had my way I would stop the coinage of the silver dollar, gather it into Uncle Sam's great vaults, and then issue certificates and let you handle them. These certificates would form the basis of our national bank circulation, and preserve what I believe to be the best system of banks in the country. The tariff and other great issues would, in a measure, regulate themselves, but the silver question is the great one of the future. One dollar of one value is what we must have before we can have that stability so necessary to national security and business success."

Maltum in Parvo.

Among the specimens exhibited at the ninth annual session of the American Society of Microscopists was the Lord's Prayer engraved on glass within the one eighteen-thousandth of a square inch. A person curious in such matters has calculated that if the whole Bible were reduced to the same scale, it would cover a trifle less than one square inch. The specimen referred to is the most minute writing ever executed.
