## THE TREATY.

### The Senate Refuses to Extend the Hawaiian Treaty.

A special despatch of Jan. 22 from Washington to the San Francisco Chronicle is as follows:—

The Hawaiian Reciprocity treaty was called up in executive session in the Senate yesterday. The opinion of that body is strongly against the treaty. The President's message urged Congress to extend the duration of the treaty for another period of seven years, which is a sufficient hint that he would veto any action of the Senate that gave notice to the Hawaiian Government that the United States desired to terminate the treaty. The Senate decided yesterday that it would take no action at all in the matter for the present. According to the treaty now in existence, it continues until either contracting party gives notice that it wishes it terminated, and twelve months after such notice the treaty ceases to operate.

The Senate refuses, by its action, to extend the treaty, and holds in its power the right to give notice to terminate it whenever that action would probably meet with the approval of the President. The treaty will continue in force while Cleveland remains in office and retains his present views on the subject, or until the members of the Senate who are opposed to it constitute two-thirds of the body. In the latter case it might be passed over a veto.

### The Honolulu Rifles to be Disbanded.

Last Friday evening, for the first time in a good while, Capt. Ashford was absent from the Honolulu Rifles. It happened that on that occasion a messenger appeared at the armory from headquarters, with a verbal order to the captain commanding to disband the corps, so that it might be reorganized under the Army and Navy Act of last session. On Saturday Capt. Ashford was given the order by word of mouth from Capt. Sam. Nowlin, Q. M. G. of the Hawaiian Forces. The captain, however, being mindful of strict charges to commandants of companies in general, that they should do nothing without regular instructions, requested the Quartermaster General to have the order reduced to writing. This course of Captain Ashford will doubtless commend itself to His Majesty for its faithful adherence to the canons of military discipline, and in all probability the object desired will be accomplished in proper form on the return of Lieut. General Dominis from Waialua. It is to be hoped that the process of transferring this fine company to a status in accordance with the new organization law may be accomplished without reducing its strength or efficiency. In an interview with Captain Ashford, our representative has learned that the monthly due of \$1.50 is required of each member, which must be a heavy tax on the incomes of many of them. Might not the property owners of Honolulu, to whom internal security is of the greatest importance, provide a fund for bearing part of the expenses of the company, so that the dues of members could be reduced somewhat?

The Alameda.

The Oceanic Steamship Company's steamer Alameda, Captain Morse, arrived from San Francisco early yesterday morning. After discharging the Honolulu freight she sailed again for the Colonies last evening. The following is a report of her passage from San Francisco to this port: "Sailed from San Francisco January 16th. Discharged pilot at 4 p. m. Stopped for Honolulu pilot January 23rd at 6:30 a. m., 6 days, 14 hours and 30 minutes. During the first two days experienced strong S. E. and N. W. winds

with heavy sea. January 24th had heavy rain storm with strong E. S. E. winds. Thence to port fine weather."
