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LOCAL NEWS.

At Fort Street Church Sunday morning, Pastor Cruzan's theme will be "Love as a Force." In the evening there will be a Thanksgiving praise service.

It is reported that Marshal Dayton has visited the numerous lei vendors and has issued orders that will considerably abate the nuisance of blockading the sidewalks.

The "Merry Makers" are expected to arrive Sunday on board the steamer City of Sydney. Walsh Norton the manager, is an old partner of Billy Emmerson the minstrel.

Last Saturday night Rev. J. A. Cruzan lost a Pastor's hand book out of his buggy. The book contains his name. The finder will please leave it at this office or return it to Mr. Cruzan.

Thursday evening, a party was given at the residence of Capt. A. Fuller. Those who were present must have passed a very pleasant evening as "home" was not thought of until about two o'clock the next morning.

At about half past five o'clock last evening a large shark, measuring from eight to ten feet in length, was seen swimming in a circle about twenty feet from the steamer W. G. Hall, lying at the Inter Island Company's wharf.

The Hawaiian Mission Children's Society will meet this evening at the residence of Hon. S. N. Castle, on King street between Punchbowl and Alapai streets. All the members of the society are cordially requested to be present.

The Rev. S. E. Bishop will preach at the Bethel Union Church Sunday morning, in place of Rev. E. C. Ogden, who is as yet too ill to attend. In the evening, services will be conducted by Mr. S. D. Fuller, General Secretary of the Y. M. C. A.

A raid was made yesterday morning on a house at a place known as Cape Horn that was suspected to be a gambling den. Several Chinamen were captured also some opium and pipes were brought to the Station House as trophies.

The PRESS has several times called attention to the dangerous and neglected condition of the King street bridge. It is observed with pleasure that repairing has been commenced, and it is hoped that when put in proper order it will be kept so.

There was quite a slippery time of it on Nuuanu street yesterday during the showers. About two o'clock in the afternoon a native policeman suddenly took a seat in the middle of the crossing near the Commercial Saloon and painted a map of Oahu on the bay-window of his white trousers. Aloha!

Posters in reference to the torchlight procession in honor of the arrival of Chief Engineer Nott of the fire department have been posted throughout town. They read as follows: "Members of the Honolulu Fire Department are requested to assemble at the Bell Tower in full uniform, without apparatus, at seven o'clock, on the evening of the day on which the Alameda arrives from San Francisco, due November 23d."

On Fort street directly opposite the Custom House yesterday forenoon, at about half past eleven, an unruly horse attached to a drag started in to amuse itself and scare the driver by rearing and jumping in a most lively manner. The animal finally attempted to jump into a hack that was passing by, and managed to get his forelegs in the place where the driver had been sitting, narrowly missing that personage. Not finding the position comfortable the horse concluded to have a little more fun by trying to kick to pieces the vehicle to which he was attached, but he was got under control in time and driven away. No damage was done other than the horse's fore leg being slightly scratched.

Yesterday afternoon the regatta committee held a meeting at the residence of Mr. W. M. Gifford. Mr. J. E. Wiseman presented the following report. The receipts were: subscriptions, \$995.25; gate money, \$41.25; and entries, \$173.00, making a grand total of \$1159.50. The largest items in the expenditures were the prize cups and money prizes which amounted to \$552.00, the other expenses amounting to \$328.75, making a total of \$880.75, leaving a surplus of \$326.75. The committee made a report to the Association which held a meeting last evening at the Custom House. As the results of the Association meeting could not be learned some alterations in this report may be made in our next issue.

The new brick Station House now being erected on Merchant between Fort and Nuuanu streets, is approaching completion. The unguaranteed bricks for the building which were piled up in the street proved too much of a temptation to the pilfering propensities of some persons, and owing to the sudden disappearance of a quantity of the building material a watch has been placed there.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will play this afternoon at Emma Square at 4:30 o'clock. There will be no concert given on Monday night, owing to the reception to be given Chief Engineer John Nott. The following is the programme for this afternoon:

The following is the programme for the reception of Chief Engineer John Nott, upon his arrival at Honolulu, after an absence to the coast of about four months. At the first whistle of the arriving steamer, members of the Fire Board will assemble at the Bell Tower. When the second whistle blows the members will go on board the tug Eleu, which will steam out to the Alameda and take Mr. Nott on board. Arriving, they will be met by the band which will act as escort to the party to the Engine House of Fire Company No. 2, where the Chief Engineer will reassume charge of the Honolulu Fire Department. Refreshment will also be served. In the evening a torchlight procession, composed of the different fire companies, will be formed and marched to residence of Mr. Nott on King street to welcome their Chief.
