OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN Hon. Fred White, Democratic Candidate for Governor, Speaks At Davenport.

Imperialism and Trusts Given Greatest Prominence in the Address —Shaw Attacked. Money Question Relegated to the Rear for Future Reference— The Text.

Davenport, Sept. 15.—Fred E. White, democratic candidate for governor, opened his campaign at Turner Grand opera house in this city last evening. He arrived in the city at noon, and was entertained during the interim by the local leaders of the party. A committee met him at the depot and escorted him to the Kimball house, where he made headquarters during his sojourn here.

During quite a lengthy and somewhat checkered political career I have never yielded to the temptation of injecting anything concerning myself into the campaign. But this time I have concluded to break the rule, for I have persuaded myself to make a public confession. I want to confess that as the term is ordinarily understood I am not a politician. Were I to do so I should be a failure in trying to play the role of the professional politician.

When forty-two years ago good fortune landed me from the over-crowded monarchy of Prussia into the then almost uninhabited prairies of our beloved Iowa, I was happy. When, before the war of '61, I began laying the foundations of my future home among a free people, I was still happier. When, at the age of 18, I was given the opportunity to do battle for the flag under whose sheltering folds I had taken refuge, thus actually earning with a musket my right to live in this country, I rejoiced. When, at the end of the war, I succeeded in marrying the woman of my choice I rejoiced still more.

As I read those lines which declared that industry and commerce should be governed by the natural laws of the world, I at once saw the republicans of Iowa had been guilty of plagiarism; had stolen the solidest part of the free trade speech I had delivered in the first session of the Fifty-second congress, in which I did my utmost to emphasize the doctrine that industry and commerce should be governed by the natural laws of the world.

The trust evil as any other evil, is curable only when the active causes that produce it are eradicated. You can as easily conquer intemperance by continuing the drink habit, as easily subdue the flame by feeding it oil, as to crush out the trusts by leaving untouched the active causes that make possible their formation. EXPERIMENTAL ROAD BUILDING. Agricultural College Adds a New Course of Instruction.

Ames, Sept. 15.—The agricultural department of the Iowa State College has recently added a new course of instruction which is of far reaching importance to the people of this state. It is a practical course of study and experiments in roadmaking. In regard to what is being done here for the purpose of giving instruction in scientific and practical road making, and he will return for future work next season.

The work that has been taken up at the agricultural college will be of far reaching value, for the reason that the most urgent need in road improvement at the present time is a well educated, competent man to supervise the work. Our present system of expending road taxes is exceedingly wasteful; the same amount of money expended under the direction of a competent road engineer would accomplish from two to four times the benefit.

Investigate the Wreck. Coroner's Jury Inquires into the Cause of the Recent Disastrous Collision. Iowa City, Sept. 15.—The coroner's jury, which was called on account of the railroad wreck near here Tuesday night, has not yet concluded its deliberations. It is claimed here that the jury desired to procure Dispatcher John R. Jones, of Des Moines, who was on duty at the time the wreck occurred, but that he cannot be located. So far as known it seems as if the dispatcher gave the east-bound meat train, Engineer Quinn and Conductor Briles, as far as the Iowa City, regardless of all second class trains. The extra west, Conductor Rohweder and Engineer Dunn, was going to Oxford to meet No. 6, passenger, east bound, on her schedule time, and the extra east was trying to make Tiffin to meet the passenger west.

Pottawattamie Democrats. Council Bluffs, Sept. 15.—The democrats of Pottawattamie county placed the following county ticket in nomination yesterday: State senator, J. W. Hemsted, Council Bluffs; state representative, J. R. Speck, Council Bluffs; S. D. Tobey, Oakland; treasurer, Brooks Reed, Council Bluffs; sheriff, John T. Hazen, Avoca; superintendent of schools, Professor H. W. Sawyer, Council Bluffs; coroner, Dr. M. J. Bellinger, Council Bluffs; surveyor, George Judson, member of Company L, Fifty-first Iowa, now in the Philippines; member of board of supervisors, Dominick Grosse, Pleasant township. The convention lacked enthusiasm, and was a very perturbed affair. The resolutions adopted were against imperialism and trusts; favor a state law for eight hours' labor for both males and females; the election of United States senator by direct vote of the people and the adoption of the primary system instead of the present caucus system.

Twenty-first Iowa Veterans. Dubuque, Sept. 15.—At the business meeting yesterday of the twenty-first Iowa veterans, A. Moss, of Greene, was elected president; F. M. Hart, of Clarksville, vice president, and I. M. Bolton, of Northwood, secretary. Clarksville was selected as the place of the next reunion. The address of President Northey was eloquent and appropriate. A banquet given last evening by the sons of the late Y. McDonald, a member of the regiment, closed the reunion. All left for their homes in the evening after one of the pleasiest gatherings ever held in Iowa.

A DESTRUCTIVE FIRE Building and Merchandise of N. Grant & Co. Badly Damaged At Manly.

Lightning Causes the Fire, Loss From Which is Estimated At \$13,000. Unusual Number of New Firms Incorporated in the State— Short Specials.

Special to Times-Republican. Manly Junction, Sept. 15.—The building and stock of N. Grant & Co., of Manly, Iowa, were destroyed by fire about 4 o'clock this morning, caused by lightning striking the building. The building is a total loss. Some of the stock was saved. A heavy rain previous to the fire prevented its spreading to other buildings. Loss about \$13,000; insured. Special to Times-Republican. Mason City, Sept. 15.—The general merchandise store at Manly, owned by Mr. Grant, of this city, was struck by lightning this morning and was entirely consumed. Loss, \$14,000; insurance, \$3,000.

NEW IOWA CORPORATIONS. Large Number of New Firms Given Permission to Do Business. Des Moines, Sept. 15.—The corporation department of the state government did a thriving business yesterday. One new state bank filed articles of incorporation, another filed an amendment to increase its capital from \$15,000 to \$50,000, and another filed articles for a renewal of its charter. Several industrial corporations also filed articles. The Cedar County State bank, one of the oldest state banking corporations in Iowa, filed application for a renewal of its charter, paying the full fee. It has \$50,000 capital, and is located at Tipton. It is one of the first state banks to secure a renewal of charter. The Castana State Bank of Castana, Monona county, filed an amendment to increase its capital from \$15,000 to \$50,000. The institution has been carrying so large a line of deposits, and other wise finds such large demands on it, that it is unable to meet the demands of its business without an increased capital.

ABOLISH SLOT MACHINES. Gladbrook Citizens Succeed in Suppressing One Form of Gambling. Special to Times-Republican. Gladbrook, Sept. 15.—A committee appointed by citizens of Gladbrook yesterday visited all the business houses where slot machines and other devices of gambling were operated and presented a monster petition to the board of citizens of the town, headed as follows: "CITIZENS' PETITION. "We, the undersigned, citizens of Gladbrook and vicinity, believing that in some of the business houses in Gladbrook there are slot machines or wheels of fortune and other devices which have a tendency to lead the young people to take chances or gamble; some of these profits to give value received, but nevertheless in the eyes of the law are regarded as a species of gambling. We respectfully ask that all of said machines or devices be at once removed. The committee was accorded the most gentlemanly treatment and all promised to remove the objectionable devices except Federson, Davenport & Co.

THE GRINNELL NEWS. City Improves a Street Grade—Local News Items. Grinnell, Sept. 15.—The city is filling the street between the Chapin House and the New Monroe, commencing at Central street and working west to Park street, or nearly to that point. It improves the street very much, as there was a bad depression on the piece of road mentioned. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Riley went to Des Moines yesterday to attend the funeral of Mrs. Riley's mother, who died at Des Moines Wednesday. Mr. and Mrs. Riley came from Oskaloosa Wednesday evening, leaving here on a morning train. A Brooklyn, Iowa, citizen says of free rural mail delivery: "If you want to give a town the blackest eye it ever received, just give the country around it the benefit of free rural mail delivery." He said that people who formerly came to town every day or so are seldom seen upon the street and it has worked a great hardship to the town. Notwithstanding the opinion of the Brooklynite, it is difficult to see how free delivery can work any damage to a town, for certainly free delivery does not, and can not, make the farmer's wants any less. He must buy exactly as many groceries, for example, as before, and the mere fact that fewer farmers come to town can work no hardship when they buy the same amount of goods. ASSAULTS HIS PARENTS. Max Bysong Captured at Sioux City —Wanted for Attempted Murder.

Sioux City, Sept. 15.—According to the story told by Sheriff A. L. Hockings, of Fayette county, Iowa, Max Bysong, who was arrested at the Sioux City stock yards by Officer Vreeland upon an information from the sheriff mentioned, is guilty of a serious crime. Bysong is said to have assaulted his father almost to death because the father told the son, who is nearly 70 years of age, refused to give him at once a deed to a farm of 120 acres, which the father had promised to give to his son as a present. Sheriff Hockings says that Bysong must have struck his father with some heavy weapon, as the left arm and four fingers were broken. The aged man's life was despaired of for several days after the affair, but he is believed now to be out of danger. Sheriff Hockings says that Bysong's father is wealthy in farm lands, owning nearly 900 acres, that are worth perhaps \$50 an acre, besides other property. Some months ago the father told the son, who is in the vicinity of 20 years of age, that he would make him a present of a fine farm of 120 acres, which he had just purchased. The son had been in trouble frequently as the result of a bad temper and served a number of jail sentences, one being for one year for assault with intent to commit murder. He is a single man and lived with his parents on a large farm. The sheriff says he was of such a vicious nature that his mother and sisters last spring left their home to live elsewhere. The son and father were living all alone when the trouble arose in which the latter was so terribly beaten.
