PRISONERS SENTENCED

H. W. Curtis Gets a Light Sentence, Receiving Four Months in the Penitentiary.

James Howard, for Larceny, Sent up For One Year—Chapman Given Time to Get Bonds.

Controversy Over the Insurance of a Dead Soldier Boy Being Heard By the Court.

H. W. Curtis, the old soldier convicted of robbing A. Renshaw, an inmate of the Home, of \$21, and James Howard, the tramp who stole some clothing belonging to Northwestern railway employes, were taken into court this morning to receive sentence. Judge Caswell gave Curtis a light sentence, as he intimated he would when he refused the application for a new trial, because of the fact that the evidence against him was not strong. His decision was that Curtis shall be confined in the penitentiary at Fort Madison for a term of four months. Howard was sentenced to one year at the same prison. Sheriff McPherson will take the prisoners to Fort Madison tonight.

Frank Chapman, the young man who robbed the United States Express Company of a package containing \$100, was also taken into court and questioned as to the fulfillment of his promise to furnish a good bond in order to secure his parole. So far Chapman has been unable to comply with this provision, and the judge gave him until night to do so. Some doubt is expressed as to Chapman's ability to furnish an acceptable bond for his appearance at the next term of court, in which case he will probably be sent to prison. Today the time of the court was occupied in the hearing of the suit of Miss Elva Wilkinson against the New York Life Insurance Company. This is an action to recover on the policy taken out by the late Ole Lunstrum, who was a private in Company H, Forty-ninth Iowa, and who died while with the regiment in Cuba. Miss Wilkinson was the fiancée of the deceased, and the policy, which was taken out about the time of Mr. Lunstrum's enlistment, named her as the beneficiary. The company is resisting the claim on the ground that deceased was in the service beyond the limits prescribed in the policy. The decision, when it is made, will be quite important.

RETURNS FROM MANILA.

Guy Whitaker, a Member of Company F, Fifty-first Iowa, Arrives Home.

Private Guy Whitaker, of Company F, Fifty-first Iowa, which was recruited at Oskaloosa, arrived in the city Tuesday night from Manila, P. I., where he has been for the past eighteen months in the service of the United States. He will visit here with his sisters, Miss Anna Whitaker, and brother, Mr. James M. Whitaker, until Saturday, when he will go to Oskaloosa to see his brother, Engineer J. E. Whitaker, of the Central. Private Whitaker is the young man who was reported in the T-R a dispirited fellow who came back as having reneged in the service. Mr. Whitaker received his discharge from his company with the intention of enlisting in the cavalry service, being informed that he could be transferred from that branch of the service to the regular hospital corps, where he desired to serve. After he received his discharge he ascertained that he could not be transferred from the volunteer to the regular service and there are no more volunteer hospital corps in the islands, and that if he enlisted in the regular army's corps he would have to remain in the islands three years longer. He did not desire to serve longer than two years and decided to come home. This accounts for his early arrival ahead of his company. Private Whitaker brought home with him an extensive and varied line of curios, principally gifts to his sisters. Many of them are from Manila, while others were secured in Japan, where he visited nearly a week while en route home. The principal curio, however, he thinks, is a bright red mustache and beard, of which he is extremely proud. Mr. Whitaker had the good fortune to escape without injury whatever, and the only thing in the way of physical ailment is the rheumatism, which he contracted from exposure in all of the engagements of the Fifty-first excepting one that occurred since he left. Private Whitaker did not know until he arrived here of the death of his bunkmate, Ed Kissick, of Oskaloosa, whose death was reported in these columns. He served beside Kissick in one severe engagement, in which a Filipino ball came near killing him, striking his rifle butt and tearing away a greater portion of it. He says Kissick had talked a great deal of keeping his rifle, and how his friends at home how near he came to losing his life. Mr. Whitaker reports that his brother, Mr. Robert Whitaker, formerly of this city, is now engaged, in company with three former comrades, in the laundry business in Manila, and hires about forty native Filipinos. He says the boys are doing a good business and making money.

The monthly report was submitted as follows: There have been donated 185 pieces of clothing, 28 pairs of shoes, 9 pairs of caps, 22 hats, caps and bonnets, 3 pieces of bedding, 4 pieces of household goods, 1 dish, 2 toys and 2 clogs.

There have been given for work 95 pieces of clothing, 22 pairs of shoes, 13 pairs of hose, 9 hats, caps and bonnets, 4 pieces of bedding, 6 pieces of household goods, 4 portions of soap, 10 dishes, 10 rolls of wall paper and 3 sates.

In the department of literature 25 books, 9 magazines and 115 papers have been donated, while 11 books, 50 magazines and 130 papers have been distributed.

In the employment department 4 have applied for help and none for work.

Work done for the society, 6 garments made, 102 quilt blocks pieced, 371 quilt pieces cut, 1 comfort top joined, 1 pound of carpet rags cut and sewed, some wood sawing, washing and house work.

C. C. TRINE IS CHOSEN

Selected to Fill Out the Unexpired Term of Capt. Whitenack as School Treasurer.

Widow of the Late Treasurer is to Receive the Salary—Board Proceedings.

Northwestern Brakeman Injured—Guy Whitaker Home From Manila—Railway Conference.

At the regular meeting of the school board, held Tuesday evening, the directors filled the position of school treasurer, made vacant by the death of Capt. R. H. Whitenack. Mr. C. C. Trine, of the Marshalltown State Bank, where the school funds have been kept during Mr. Whitenack's term, was chosen to the vacancy, with the expressed agreement that the customary salary—paid by the bank holding the funds—be paid to the widow of Capt. Whitenack during the full time that he would have lived, or for the next six months. The bond of the new treasurer was fixed at \$50,000, and Messrs. Atkinson and Devine were selected as a committee to check over the accounts. President Turner and Directors Atkinson and Devine were present at the meeting. As a preliminary to the inauguration of the new treasurer, the school room was previously purchased, but this has been found inadequate. The teachers are evidently compelling their use to a considerable extent. Miss Kathryn Morgan, principal of the First ward school, was given an increase of \$5 monthly in her salary, on account of her increased duties. A vote of thanks was extended to the Women's Club for the invitation to the recent reception. Last year the teachers were given one day in addition to the regular visiting day and the privilege of spending the day at the home of the principal. The school board and teachers availed themselves of the opportunity and the visit was a profitable one, therefore the same privilege will be extended them this year, at a time to be determined upon by Superintendent Willard.

A BRAKEMAN HURT.

C. A. Bauserman, of Marengo, Injured on the Northwestern.

C. A. Bauserman, a brakeman on the Northwestern and employed on a work train at Quarry, was injured at about 10:30 o'clock this forenoon, and at 11 o'clock was brought to this city and taken to the Getz hospital. Bauserman was at work on a flat car and while in the act of pulling a pin when his glove caught and he was thrown forward between the cars. He was doubled up in such a manner as to receive quite serious injuries, being carried along for several feet, although the wheels did not pass over any portion of his body. His left arm and shoulder were badly strained and bruised, and several contusions were received in the region of the spine, between the shoulder blades and across the chest. There is a possibility that more serious internal injuries will develop. Bauserman is a single man, 23 years of age, and his home is in Marengo.

A RAILROAD CONFERENCE.

Iowa Central Conductors Meet Superintendent Huntington Today.

An important railroad conference between Iowa Central conductors and General Superintendent C. W. Huntington occurred today at the office of the latter in this city. The conference was held behind closed doors, and in conversation with one or two conductors nothing was revealed as to the nature of the business. The principal matter talked over, however, was the formation of a schedule, in which the conductors asked better pay and a rearrangement of hours, or shorter working days. Business has been so brisk on the road of late that many of the men were compelled to double the line in twenty-four hours, not giving them the proper amount of rest. Conductor George E. Payne, of Mason City, J. H. Carroll and W. W. Webb, of Oskaloosa, members of the adjustment committee, were present at the conference with the general superintendent.
