HOW TO MARK A BALLOT
Australian System, Though in Use Several Years, Still a Puzzle To Some.
Some Things to Be Avoided in Marking Ballots on Next Tuesday.

Safest Way is to Put a Cross in the Circle at the Head and Vote It Straight.
 Every recurring election demonstrates that there is still more or less confusion regarding the methods of marking the Australian ballot, and every year the judges of election find it necessary to reject numbers of ballots. The ballot law was not placed upon the statutes for the purpose of disfranchising any voter, but rather to make the ballot a free instrument in the hands of those entitled to suffrage. In preparing these safeguards it was necessary to formulate a law that is more or less complicated to those who allow themselves to become confused, but easily obeyed when the instructions are thoroughly understood.
 Those who vote the ticket of their party straight find little trouble in marking their ballots. Therefore, the safest way for republicans to do next Tuesday is to place a cross in the circle at the head of the republican ticket. Then they are sure not to lose their votes. But for the benefit of those who insist on voting other than the straight ticket of one party or another, the following instructions are important:
 1. By marking a cross in the circle opposite (to the left hand) the party name at the head of the ticket.
 2. By marking a cross in the square opposite (to the left hand) the name of each candidate for whom you wish to vote.
 Unless you wish to vote for all the candidates on one ticket, or a straight ticket, the circle should not be marked. If you mark a cross in the circle at the head of the ticket and also mark a cross in the square opposite the name of some candidate on another ticket your vote will not be counted for any candidate for the office for which the person opposite whose name such cross was made is a candidate. You lose your vote as to that office.
 If you mark a cross in the square opposite the name of more candidates than can be elected in any office your vote as to that office will not be counted.
 Do not scratch out or cancel with pen or pencil any name on the ballot. Do not scratch out or mark across or deface any ticket that you do not vote.
 In marking the cross the lines should be made to cross each other inside of the circle or square.
 Put no marks of any kind on the ballot other than the crosses in the circle or squares as above indicated, except as stated in the following paragraph:
 If you wish to vote for some person whose name is not printed on the ballot you can write his name in the appropriate blank and mark a cross in the square opposite thereto. If there is no blank space on the ballot you can underline the name of the candidate of your choice in the proper place and make a square opposite thereto and mark a cross therein. In this case do not mark the circle, but use the first method of marking the ballot above named.
 No unmarked or improperly marked ballot will be counted.
 If you cannot read the English language or because of any physical disability are unable to mark your ballot, make known that fact to the judges. You will then be sworn to the truth of your statement, designated by the judges, will enter the voting booth with you and shall mark the ballot for you as you may direct.
 Intoxication will not be regarded as a physical disability and if you are intoxicated no assistance in marking your ballot will be given.
 Any erasure or identification marks or otherwise spoiling or defacing a ballot will render it invalid.
 Hence if you have marked a cross in a square or circle which you did not intend to mark or have by accident or mistake made any mark, blot or in any way defaced, soiled or torn the ballot, return it to the judges and obtain another, as above directed.
 Do not write your name on the ballot or put any mark or sign upon it by which it can be identified as the ballot which you voted.
 Any person entitled to a vote at a general election who is employed by any person or corporation shall be entitled to absent himself from service of such employer for two hours between the opening and closing of the polls on election day, which period may be designated by the employer, and such voter shall be liable for a penalty not shall be deducted from his usual salary wages be made on account of such absence.
 But to entitle you to the benefit of this provision of law, application for such absence must be made to your employer the day before election.

AMUSEMENTS.
Mr. Spencer and Company in "Paul Kaurav."
 A very capable company, headed by Mr. E. R. Spencer and Miss Isabel Pengra, came to the Odeon last night, presenting "Paul Kaurav," a piece well known as a story of the French revolution. The audience was not large, but was very appreciative. The only unfavorable criticism to be advanced was in the tendency of the leading characters to overdo their parts. LOCAL COMMENT.
 Many lose their votes each year since the new law went into effect because they do not reach the polls until they are closed. The polling places close promptly at 8 o'clock p. m., and all votes must be received before that hour. The opening hour is 7 o'clock a. m.

Mr. White appeared to feel that he was looked upon as a sort of monstrosity.

WANTS HIS INDIAN WIFE
Young Indian From Tama Resorts to Habeas Corpus to Gain Possession of His Wife.
Suit Brought in the Marshall County Courts and Will Come Up Next Week.
The Girl Wife Held by the Indian Agent and Compelled to Go To School.

The government authorities in charge of the Sac and Fox Indian reservation east of this city in Tama county are still having trouble in the efforts to compel the Indian boys and girls to attend the school provided for them. One phase of the trouble has now got into the Marshall county courts and one of the young bucks has resorted to habeas corpus proceedings to gain possession of his young wife.
 These efforts at compulsory education of the Indians to get into court a short time ago, one of the Indians having been arrested on the charge of kidnapping a girl. The runaway couple was arrested and brought back, but the court discharged the bride. The government has inaugurated the policy of having white men appointed guardians for the young Indians. Then the guardians claim the authority to compel the attendance of their wards at the government school. This system has stirred up considerable feeling, if it can be called true, and now a contest is to be made on the point as to whether a guardian has greater authority over the Indians than does the husband of one of the girls. The case is quite romantic and the young Indians are evidently as great strategists in making their case as the white men are in making their. Application for habeas corpus has been prepared and will be presented before Judge Burnham in the district court next week to secure the release from the custody of the school officials and the return to her husband of Leah Puckachee, a biting bride of one week. The application is made by Leah's husband, Ta-Ta-Pi-Cha, through E. I. Wilcox, who poses as the friend of the Indians, and who has placed the case in charge of an attorney of this city, G. W. Mallin, Indian agent, and G. N. Nellis, superintendent of the school. The petition recites that on the 29th of October of this year Leah-Puc-Ka-Chee and Ta-Ta-Pi-Cha were married; that on the afternoon of Nov. 1 Agent Mallin and Superintendent Nellis "willfully, maliciously and unlawfully" forced and violated and tore Leah from her husband, for the purpose of taking her to the Indian school, and that she is still detained there. The petition attacks the legality of the guardianship of Leah, because before her marriage she was in charge of her own person, and she has since been cared for by her husband, and also alleged that the guardianship was obtained under misrepresentations. The petitioners ask that the court order her return to her husband.
 If this suit is successful it is probable that others will be brought if Ta-Ta-Pi-Cha's wife all the young Indian girls may want to get married so they will not have to attend school.


PARKER AND LYON SPEAK.
Republican Politics and Issues Cleared Up in Vienna Township.
 Col. J. M. Parker and George M. Lyon addressed a representative audience of Vienna township citizens Friday night at the center school house. In the audience were several ladies, and much interest was manifested in the proceedings by all. Col. Lyon spoke by request, "Our Title to the Philippines," while Mr. Parker expounded the views upon the general prosperity of the country, and the favorable conditions that exist today throughout the entire country.
 The speakers defined very clearly the respective issues upon which they spoke in response to the audience went away feeling that they understood more clearly than ever before the republican doctrine as regards the new possessions of Uncle Sam and the prosperity of the country under republican rule. The tentative John P. Gossen entertained the speakers at supper prior to the meeting.

CEDAR RAPIDS TOTO.
That City Has Had a Little Experience With Mr. Hill and His Bill.
 The Cedar Rapids council had in its employ, at the same time that Marshalltown had, a water expert, Mr. Hill by name. The Cedar Rapids council has paid Mr. Hill's first bill, and the refusal of the Marshalltown council to do likewise has caused the Republican to philosophize thusly:
 "It would seem that the city council of Marshalltown is not animated by that gentle and confiding spirit, toward water works experts characteristic of the powers that be among the cities of this world."
 "It will be remembered that the Cedar Rapids council employed Mr. Hill of Cincinnati, O., to make some inquiries and investigations in a most trustful and child-like spirit. They were, it would seem, perfectly willing to take Mr. Hill's statements on his word, without inquiry or question, shadow of reasonable doubt, or anything else. They have already paid him \$750 for services. Just what these services were did not appear in the official report, with any degree of minuteness. Having allowed Mr. Hill to collect \$1,500 worth of service at the rate of \$50 a day, which service being rendered has not yet been made public. The public has been given to understand, however, that everything that Mr. Hill has done is all very good, and that we must take his expenses and has been compelled to drop some men who were earning about \$1.50 a day.
 "Not so the city fathers of Marshalltown. They have had Mr. Hill's services, but they have not yet received his bill. Hence the Mr. Hill discerned difference between the Cedar Rapids council and the Marshalltown contingent, and filed his bill at the latter place with an attorney to start on. It seems that in Marshalltown they are in doubt as to the quality of the service, also as to whether they had Mr. Hill's undivided attention during the period of his Marshalltown engagement. It is

claimed, we believe, by the Marshalltown people, that he had Cedar Rapids and Dubuque on the string at the same time.
 "It is probable that the whole gist of the controversy will be made plain after awhile. We trust very sincerely that in any gold bricks, and we imagine that anyone can congratulate Mr. Hill on his earning capacity. At Dubuque he was the expert for the water company, and if we remember the testimony rightly, was able to make out a very good case for that corporation. Should his views as expressed in Dubuque be duplicated here we fancy the council might probably lose some of its child-like faith. But expert testimony is not an invariable entity, and all types of it have come to be discounted. As a rule you pay your money, and you get what you want. But it seems to be different at Marshalltown.
