

IOWA NEWS ITEMS

DENISON—W. C. Pollock marketed forty-two head of hogs this week which netted him the neat sum of \$442.

MARION CITY—The new Northwest railroad line from Blue Earth, Minn., will reach Mason City Friday evening.

DEEP RIVER—The creamery is being rapidly rebuilt and will soon be ready for occupancy. It is nearly ready for the new machinery.

WATERLOO—The brick work on the new building of the Cedar Valley Telephone Company was completed yesterday. About 160,000 brick were used in its construction.

BELLE PLAINE—T. M. Jamison, of our city, has abandoned railroading and, having purchased an interest in a dry goods store at Reinbeck, will become a merchant of that city in a few days.

WEBSTER CITY—The Elks of this city have been presented with a magnificent eight-foot palm which they have placed in their club rooms. It is a beauty and easily worth \$50, according to the Freeman-Tribune.

GRUNDY CENTER—Hugh Elliott has sold his 200-acre farm in Lincoln township to Eugene L. Bailey. Consideration, \$10,000, or \$53 per acre.

WATERLOO—The meetings at the Baptist church are increasing in interest and power and the attendance is excellent.

NEVADA—The real estate transfers this week contain quite a number of conveyances to the Northwestern railroad, which are for the widening of the right-of-way made necessary by double track operations. There is also conveyed to the road a piece just east of the crossing at Ames, where it is supposed that the new Ames depot will be built some time.

FORT DODGE—An architect is now engaged on the plans for the new three-story Cahill block, to replace the frame one-story structure that burned last week. The block will be one of the handsomest small blocks in Fort Dodge and will be built of the best quality of Webster county pressed brick, and the dimensions of the building will be 122 feet.

COUNCIL BLUFFS—The American Home Finding Society of Manning, Iowa, has submitted to the officials of Pottawattamie county a proposition for finding homes for public charges at the following rates: Children, all ages, \$35 each; mother and one child, \$25; boys up to 12 years of age, \$35; older boys up to 16, at various prices, depending on their characters; adults, usually less than \$25.

ALGONA—O. B. Durdall is back from Chicago, where he has bought his hotel outfit. He puts in high-priced Axminster carpets in the halls and parlors, Brussels carpet in all the bedrooms, iron beds with elaborate brass trimmings, and other things to match. He and Mr. Tremaine ordered \$5,000 worth of furniture and furnishings, all good in quality and late in style. There will be no cheap stuff put into the house.

DAVENPORT—The Davenport, Clinton & Eastern track layers reached the Wapsie bridge Tuesday and expect to enter Princeton by Saturday of this week. The false work over the Wapsie bridge has been constructed and the bridge is ready for the rails. The wooden trestle will have to be temporary service for a time, until the steel arches to make it permanent. The steel has been ordered, but will not be delivered until winter. At the present rate work is moving the entire terminal system will be in operation by the first of the year.

FAIRFIELD—Tuesday W. H. Stoner, of Buchanan township, sold to J. N. Smith nineteen head of fat steers averaging 1,517 pounds. They brought \$530 per hundred, the highest price paid in this market for a long time.

It is probable that railroad work in this vicinity will last all winter. The work which the C. B. & Q. Company is doing on its new double track will be continued as long as the weather will permit, while the Flick & Johnson Construction Company is making preparations for an all-winter campaign.

NEWTON—Mrs. Jacob Hixson, one of the oldest residents of Jasper county, died at her home in Hixson Grove on Monday evening, Nov. 6, 1899. She had been in apparently good health, was up and around and had helped with the dinner dishes that day. The sudden attack was caused by heart disease, and in only an hour or two after she was dead. Margaret Harper was born Nov. 9, 1820, in Randolph county, West Virginia. On the 17th of June, 1847, she plighted her marriage vows with Mr. Jacob Hixson. They came to Jasper county in 1852.

FORT MADISON—Engineer Ball, of the Santa Fe, came here a few days since from St. Louis, Kan., to take a passenger run, having received a promotion. Wednesday evening he visited the round house and exhibited signs of insanity. The police department was notified and Officer Masters went down and took charge of the man. Later Engineer William Bock called as a member of the B. & M. E. and assumed custody of the unfortunate man, when Ball was turned over to him. He is an old engineer on the line, having the confidence of employers and fellow laborers.

SIoux CITY—The body of Mrs. Duff, which was held for express charges for shipment from Clarinda to Danbury, has been released and the funeral took place Wednesday afternoon. A telegram was sent to the express company at Clarinda asking it to reduce the amount of the charges and a reply came stating that the amount as charged was correct; that it was only \$30.85 instead of \$50.85. With this information a subscription paper was started in Danbury and the money raised in a little while and paid to the company, also enough to pay the expense of the funeral.


