TOWN IS AGAIN "WET"

All the Saloons of the City Reopened Their Doors This Morning.

This Action Taken as the Result of Another Move Before the Supreme Court.

Rehearing of the Case to Be Granted and the Previous Decision Suspended.

Every saloon in Marshalltown opened for business this morning, after being closed the greater part of the week.

This action was taken because of a new ruling of the supreme court.

At Des Moines late Friday afternoon attorneys appeared before the supreme court and filed a motion for a rehearing of the case of West vs. H., the suit in which the recent decision regarding the petitions of consent was made. The court sustained the motion for a rehearing, and also granted a suspension of the ruling of last Tuesday. The Des Moines saloons opened, at once, as indicated in the dispatches printed elsewhere in this issue.

Word of the action of the court was telegraphed to the saloonists of this city about 8 o'clock p. m., but owing to the lateness of its receipt no attempt was made to transact business until morning.

In the meantime the hearing on the new petition of consent will be proceeded with, the saloonists' attorneys say, as they are confident the petition is sufficient and that they will then be able to effect the decision of the high court when the matter comes up for rehearing.

Members of the church committee opposing the petition say that they will make no effort to close the Marshalltown saloons pending the hearing on the new petition, but will follow the path of campaign previously decided upon. The committee has completed the work of comparing the names on the petition. They say they have found a number of names duplicated and others of men who did not vote at the last general election, but whether enough to secure the rejection of the petition they do not say. One member of the committee said the petition was a very good one.

LOCAL COMMENT.

Conventions are coming Marshalltown's way nowadays, without the expenditure of much effort. There are already booked for the present year the conventions of the Iowa Supervisors' Association, the Iowa Teachers' Association, with that of the Central Iowa Teachers' Association as a probability.

The excess pension question at the Soldiers' Home will not down. There is merit on both sides of the question and it is probable there will be a fight in the legislature on the bill to be introduced with the object of preventing the board of control from enforcing the rule requiring the surrender to the state of all pension money in excess of \$6. If the legislature abrogates this rule it is possible the limit of admission will be lowered to such a point that those pensioners receiving nearly enough for their individual support will be barred from the institution and room made for veterans who receive no pension. The question is one that should be decided in the interests of the veterans and their families and at the same time on sound business principles.

In the midst of the cold weather the price of milk is coming down. During the winter thus far the dairymen have charged 6 cents per quart, but this price is being reduced now to 5 cents by the leading dealers of the city. The poor are not always out of luck.

The word smallpox to some communities is, in its effect, like a red flag to a bull, and there is not much more reason to fear an epidemic of one than the supposed effect of the other. It is surprising that an enlightened community like Gilman should resort to the measures just adopted there in the case of a young lady from this city. Said lady had been visiting in both Gilman and Grinnell, and then spent one day in Marshalltown before returning to Gilman for a longer stay. On her arrival there she was quarantined, with the family she was visiting. The T-R takes this opportunity to assure its Gilman friends that people eat, sleep and walk the streets in the vicinity of the six quarantined houses, and go about their business without fear or trembling, giving little thought to the fact that there are a few very mild cases of smallpox in the city.

The greatest fear the people of Marshalltown seem to have is that if they become slightly ill from any cause the doctors will diagnose their affliction wrongly. This is shown from the fact that the physicians who treat persons afflicted with the more serious diseases or not, note a great falling off in the number of their calls. The doctors are losing much more in this way than they gain from the numerous vaccination operations. This is only history repeating itself, and goes to disprove the foolish assertion, not infrequently heard that the doctors have profited of getting up a scare for the sole purpose of financial gain. This charge is uncalled for, nonsensical and very unkind to a profession that does more for suffering humanity than any other.

Every one will concede that the saloonists of Marshalltown acted wisely in closing their doors on receipt of the news of the supreme court decision regarding the petitions of consent. They opened again at the very first opportunity afforded by the legal move. It would have been a foolhardy disobedience of law to have kept open. The church committee has completed the comparison of the new petition, and it is understood will send out a list of the same to every signer, with the request to notify the committee if the name was placed there without authority.
