Gilman Dispatch: Joseph Kelly, who  
was a hawser dealer in Chicago from  
before the great fire in 1871 until a year  
ago, but who now makes his home in  
Marshalltown with his daughter, Mrs.  
C. W. Whitehead, is a guest of his  
grandson, Joe Whitehead, and wife,  
northwest of here.  
Mr. and Mrs. Harry I. Yeager, who  
were recently married at Gilman, and  
who were intending to make their home  
at Muscatine, where Mr. Yeager has  
been living for some time, have decided  
to locate in Grinnell, where Mr. Yeager  
who is a jeweler, has secured a better  
position than the one held at Musca-  
tine.  
Lester Williams, a negro, was in the  
mayor's court this morning charged  
with vagrancy, having been arrested by  
Officer Clark. He was given three hours  
to leave town and did so. Williams is  
the negro who recently completed a jail  
sentence for assaulting a colored woman  
named Olmstead. John Fitzwilliam,  
arrested for intoxication by Officer  
Weaver, was sentenced to six days on  
the rock pile.  
Mr. N. W. Gossard, general agent for  
this territory for the Warder, Bushnell  
& Glasser Company, Springfield, O.,  
manufacturers of Champion mowers  
and other farm machinery, with head-  
quarters in this city, received notice  
yesterday of a promotion, with a corre-  
sponding increase in salary, and assign-  
ment to duty at Carroll. Mr. Gossard  
will go to Carroll on Monday to take  
charge of his new field. It is not likely  
that he will remove his family from  
Marshalltown, but he may conclude to  
go so at some future time.  
Jacob Thompson, the young man who  
was so severely scalded on the morning  
of July 4 while carrying boiling hot wa-  
ter from the Sundell Cafe, range to the  
coffee urn, is slowly improving at the  
home of his brother, Joseph Thompson,  
on Anson street. In order to further the  
improvement of the young man's con-  
dition the skin grafting process was in-  
duced in yesterday by his attending  
physician, and parts of his skin, taken  
from the healthy portion of  
Thompson's body, were grafted onto  
one or two places where the burned sur-  
face was especially large.  
A fire alarm shortly after 10 o'clock  
this forenoon from box 362 called the  
department to the corner of West Church  
and Sixth streets, where a blaze had  
started in a storehouse located on the  
residence property of F. N. Dinges. The  
firemen made a quick run and fast work  
in subduing the blaze, and but little  
damage was done. The contents of the  
shed belonged to Mr. Dinges and James  
Ellis, a tenant in one of the former's  
houses. The building is located within  
ten feet of both residences and had the  
firemen not been so prompt it is prob-  
able both residences would have been  
more or less damaged.  
The Chicago & Northwestern has is-  
sued new orders in regard to the haul-  
ing of "dead" engines in the future.  
When a "dead" engine is part of the  
train it must not be placed nearer than  
four cars to the engine that is drawing  
the train, and if there is more than one  
"dead" engine they must be placed at  
least four cars apart. This is necessary  
as two heavy engines passing over a  
small bridge at the same time would be  
liable to cause serious damage. The or-  
der also prohibits the placing of light  
box cars between locomotives, as a sud-  
den stop on the part of the freight train  
is liable to crush the lighter cars be-  
tween the heavy ones.  
Concerning a Marshall county boy  
who has been serving in the Philippines  
the Gilman Dispatch of today says:  
"Fred Hicks who spent nearly two  
years in Uncle Sam's army in the Philip-  
pines, arrived home Tuesday evening.  
Fred landed in San Francisco about a

and while down there he registered for  
the land drawing, but did not win. We
