WILL DEMAND INCREASE

The Miners' Convention Decide to Ask an Advance of 12 1-2 Per Cent

COMMITTEE REPORT IS ADOPTED

Socialist Delegates Fail to Get Endorsement of International Socialism—Proposition to Establish Co-Operative Stores Also Defeated—Mitchell Discusses Coal Shortage.

Indianapolis, Jan. 24.—A 12 1/2 per cent increase over the present wage scale for all mine employes, a 7 per cent differential between pick and machine mined coal, and a run-of-mine basis through the competitive district which includes Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and western Pennsylvania, is the substance of the report made by the wage committee to the United Mine Workers' convention.

Chairman Haskins, in presenting the report, said the committee was unanimous in its desire to reach a uniform basis throughout the competitive district. The most important discussion yesterday was over a resolution reported from an Iowa local asking the convention to endorse international socialism.

It was well known that the officers of the mine workers' organization, but this also was defeated. Secretary-treasurer Wilson announced in the debate that there was no opposition to miners establishing such stores as individuals, but the organization could not endorse any such project.

The committee on officers reports endorsed all the recommendations contained in President Mitchell's address, and especially that the fight in West Virginia be kept up, and that \$10,000 be appropriated to carry an appeal to the United States supreme court from the decision of Judge Jackson.

The committee recommended the appointment of a special committee to consider creating a reserve fund and endorsing President Mitchell's attitude in giving the anthracite miners equal voice with the bituminous miners in ordering a strike.

MITCHELL ON COAL SHORTAGE. President of Miners Talks of Causes and Effects.

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There are two causes for the shortage of coal. The product was 22,000,000 tons less in 1902 than the product of the Pennsylvania and the West Virginia mines was in 1901.

It was suggested to him by a member of the committee that miners' unions charge from \$25 to \$50 for charter fees and if it had not been for this fact the coal famine in localities in Indiana would have gone in and operated mines. Mr. Mitchell said:

"Farmers could have organized on payment of \$15 charter fees whether they were miners or not. The dues would amount to 25 cents a month, ordinarily, except for assessments. If the farmers had tried to operate the mines they could have been utilized. Usually in Illinois the price charged for a charter is \$10, but it depends somewhat on the size of the lodge. Inability of the railroads to move the coal," he continued, "is responsible for the shortage, and I think that operators as a whole are doing what they can to relieve the situation. Our country is about 11,000,000 tons of anthracite comes west, and much of that has practically been shut off. It is largely the case that the shortage being experienced in Indiana now is easily accounted for by natural reasons and natural causes. I have not heard of any cases of collusion between dealers and operators, and I do not believe there are any."

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
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
