CARRIERS GET RAISE

Postoffice Appropriation Passed With Provision Increasing Rural Carriers' Pay

THEY MUST NOT ACT AS AGENTS

Under the New Provision Carriers Will Not be Allowed to Solicit For Newspapers, Catalog Houses, Etc.—Lively Debate on the Measure—Amendments Voted Down.

Washington, March 25.—The house passed the postoffice appropriation bill after a prolonged debate on the paragraph affecting rural letter carriers, which Thursday was stricken out, but which Friday was inserted with enthusiasm under a special order of the committee on rules.

The bill has been under discussion since March 7. At times members vigorously assailed the postoffice department and General Bristow and demands were made for an investigation into the entire postal service, but Chairman Overstreet, who has borne the brunt of the attacks, stood as a barrier to such action.

When the house convened Friday Mr. Dalzell, of Pennsylvania, of the committee on rules, brought a resolution reinserting in the postoffice appropriation bill the sections stricken Thursday, relating to the pay of rural carriers and the prohibition with reference to their acting as soliciting agents for persons, firms or corporations.

A similar rule regarding the paragraph appropriating \$5,000 for the salary for a purchasing agent for the postoffice department, which went over Thursday, was reported by Mr. Grosvenor for the rules committee, and unanimously agreed to.

During a lengthy discussion about the rules of the house, Mr. Williams, a member of the rules committee said he voted for the resolution because it enabled the house to consider fully the question of rural carriers. He elicited republican applause when he said the worst thing the advocates of increased pay for city carriers could do would be to secure measures tending to equalize them with the rural carriers.

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Mr. Overstreet desired to put a question, but Mr. Mann hotly remarked that Mr. Overstreet was not in a position to ask or answer questions.

THE CEDAR VALEY CIRCUIT

The 2:10 Pace Has Been Listed Instead of the Free-For-All Which Was Dropped—Fort Dodge Wins Bowling Championship—English Will Fight Riley in Chicago.

Wins Featherweight Championship From Young Corbett on Points in a Desperate Twenty Round Mill at San Francisco Last Night.

San Francisco, March 25.—Jimmy Britt was given the decision over young Corbett in the twenty round contest here last night for the featherweight championship. The fight went to the limit and while both men were on their feet at the close of the twentieth round Corbett was holding and stalling desperately to prevent a knockout and Britt holding the advantage and doing all the leading. The fight was fierce from start to finish and both men were badly battered and covered with blood before the fight was half over.

One distinguishing feature of the circuit program this year is the dropping of the free-for-all pace and inserting instead a 2:10 pace. The reason for this is that in the whole string of races a few horses in the pacing class may be a few seconds faster than competitors, and thus clean up the money all over the circuit and making consequently but three or four horses to enter in each meet. To do away with this 2:10 pace has been placed instead and is expected to give popularity with the race loving public as well as with the horsemen. The present indications are that the 2:10 pace will give a far better class of entries and please a better.

The program this year of the circuit starts at Nashua, May 24, 25 and 26, and ends at Boone, August 16, 17 and 18, thus giving thirteen weeks of consecutive good racing in the circuit. Three days of each week are fixed for the meet at each individual association. The cities composing the circuit are not more than 100 miles apart, thus making a course so compact that few others equal it in this respect, while the purses are above the average for such a circuit.


