

JAPAN LOSES BIG BATTLE SHIP AND CRUISER BY ACCIDENTS

Nearly a Thousand Men Lost In the Disaster to the Japanese Navy Off the Harbor of Port Arthur

BATTLE SHIP STRIKES RUSSIAN MINES

The Hatsuse, One of the Finest of the First-Class Battle Ships, Lost and Nearly Five Hundred of Her Crew Drowned—Cruiser Kasugua Rams the Cruiser Yoshino During a Fog and Latter Sinks With Two Hundred of Her Crew—Casualties of Battle of May 1 Officially Reported.

BULLETIN.

Tokio, May 19.—Admiral Togo has reported as follows:

A report from Rear Admiral Dewa says the cruisers Kasuga and Yoshino collided during a fog off Port Arthur, May 15. The Yoshino sank, only ninety of her crew being saved.

On the same day the battleship Hatsuse struck a Russian mine and sank.

Admiral Togo says: "At 1:14 on the afternoon of May 15 in a deep fog off Port Arthur, the Kasuga (correct) rammed Yoshino, sinking the latter in a few minutes. Ninety of her crew were saved.

"The same morning the Hatsuse, while cruising off Port Arthur, covering a landing of soldiers, struck a mine ten knots southeast of the harbor entrance. She signalled for help and instantly struck another mine. She sank in half an hour. Three hundred of her crew were saved by torpedo boats."

BULLETIN. Washington, May 19.—Minister Allen cables the state department from Seoul today as follows:

"The Korean government by imperial decree, issued last night, has annulled all treaties and agreements with the Russian government. This annulment comprises Yalu timber concessions."

BULLETIN. St. Petersburg, May 19.—The admiral denies it has been officially advised of Japanese occupation of New Chwang.

BULLETIN. Seoul, May 19.—At the Japanese headquarters here it is said that Colonel Kinoshita's infantry battalion, which is pursuing the Russians, arrived at Kai Chyong, May 15. Small parties scouted the country ahead and reported the Russians were covering their retreat by destroying bridges and blocking passes in the hills.

BULLETIN. Chicago, May 19.—The Daily News special from the Che Foo says: While cruising off Dalny this morning the Daily News dispatch boat Fawan was stopped and examined by the Japanese cruiser Kasuga. The Japanese officers informed us two Russian destroyers escaped from Port Arthur and are still at large. They stated the Russians were using a Chinese gunboat to place mines in the path of the Japanese fleet patrolling the peninsula coast.

FEAR FOR VLADIVOSTOK. Next Bombardment of Japanese Likely to Do Much Harm. St. Petersburg, May 19.—A copy of Vladivostok Vostochny Vestnik, which has just reached this city, expresses fears that the next bombardment of the Japanese will be more effective than that of March 6th. It says it is expected the enemy's ships will take up a position in Amur Bay, now free from ice in which they could not maneuver in March, compelling them to fire from Usuri bay. The paper foresees great loss of life when the Japanese again shell Vladivostok. The authorities here have ordered hundreds of non-combatants to leave the city. Voicing the views of experts, the paper says that it does not believe a land attack will have a chance of success.

MAKES CLEAN WOUNDS. The Russians Say the Japanese Bullets Are Fine. Liao Yang, May 19.—Russian army surgeons are praising the Japanese bullets. They inflict a small, clear wound, though they possess good stopping effect. Captain Vorobreff was struck by twenty bullets during the fight at Yalu river, but he survived and is expected to recover. SERIOUS LOSS TO JAPAN.

The Yoshino was a cruiser of 4,180 tons displacement and 15,000 indicated horse power. She was built in England and launched in 1892; was 350 feet long, had 46 1/2 feet beam and her draft was 17 feet. Her crew numbered 800 men. The cruiser with which the Yoshino collided may be the Kasuga, (or Kasagi), a cruiser of 5,116 tons, built in Philadelphia in 1897-98, or it may be the armored cruiser, Kasuga, formerly of the Merino, purchased from Argentina in Italy and taken by British officers to Japan just previous to the outbreak of the war.

The Hatsuse was a battle ship of 15,000 tons displacement and of the latest model. She was only completed in 1900, and was built in England, was 400 feet long, 76 1/2 feet beam, draught of 37 feet. Her crew numbered 741 men.

Mianhon Station on Manchuria Railway, May 18.—The task of safeguarding the railroad against the constant and determined attacks of the Japanese and Chinese agents has caused Russian military authorities unremitting labor. The line must be reserved at all hazards, especially for use in case of a retreat, and the task is entrusted to a separate corps of frontier guards, consisting of 25,000 men.

The road, which is 1,400 miles long, is divided into sections of thirty-three miles each, guarded by a detachment of troops which is expected to constantly patrol. The smallest of the detachments makes the duty onerous, and it is a matter of comparative ease for the Japanese spy or Chinese bandit to steal up to an exposed point and dynamite it before the patrols discover the danger.

LOSSES OF MAY 1.

Official Report of Kuroki Gives the Details—Japs Near Port Arthur. Tokio, May 19.—General Kuroki reports the Japanese losses at the battle of Kiu Liao, Cheng, May 1 were:

Killed, five officers and 218 men; wounded, 24 officers, 783 men. Thirteen hundred and sixty-three Russian dead were buried, eighteen officers and 583 men made prisoners. The Japanese captured twenty-one quick firing guns, nineteen ammunition wagons, 1,417 shells, eight machine guns, 37,000 shells for these guns, 1,021 rifles, 350,000 rounds of ammunition, 618 boxes of horsing, ten wagons, 1,244 coats, 541 tents.

At Feng Wang Cheng the Japanese captured 350 shells for mountain guns, 188,000 rounds of ammunition, 1,720 coats, 40,000 loaves of bread and other supplies, together with hunting tools and telegraph stores. It is unofficially reported that small skirmishes are taking place south of Kiu Chou. On the Liao Tung peninsula the Japanese line extends from Chin Chanton to Chule Sian, across the ridge of hills a mile and a half north of the narrowest part of the peninsula and forty miles north of Port Arthur. The Japanese line, therefore, is less than forty-five miles from Port Arthur.

THE RUSSIANS BEWILDERED.

Seem Unable to Form Lasting Plans for Meeting the Enemy. New Chwang, May 19.—The courier of the Associated Press, who arrived here at midnight, reports the Japanese fleet was sighted from Tower hill, ten miles north of Kai Chou. On Monday the bombardment of the coast covered a distance of twenty-five miles. Only a few Russian destroyers were reported. The Japanese force marched several miles inland and destroyed four miles of railroad and other property, captured a Russian commissary train and returned with a number of cows, animals and native drivers. The Japanese then re-embarked and sailed southward. It is believed the landing was a feint to cover the movements elsewhere. A regiment of Russian infantry returned here yesterday afternoon. It is reported the batteries of artillery will reach here today. The Russians seem bewildered, disheartened and unable to form lasting plans. The officers who left here after bidding a touching farewell to friends returned a few hours later and began directing the work of building an entrenchment a mile south of here. But this task was abandoned in a few hours. It is believed here the Russian authorities at Mukden are responsible for this vacillation. The Russians are retreating by Russian gunboats. Suvouch, which had been dismantled and loaded with wood and oil in order to destroy her, as well as two small river boats in the mud dock. The Russian statements in regard to the situation are absolutely unreliable. Many Japanese spies are here or in this neighborhood. One spy has been executed. It was believed he was an army officer. A correspondent of the Associated Press made an attempt to reach Kin Chou, but was stopped by Russian scouts and compelled to return to New Chwang. Russian civil authorities here are making desperate efforts to induce Chinese guards to take over the municipal government of New Chwang, but the guards do not show any disposition to do so. The bandits continue capturing rich Chinese, holding them captives until ransoms are paid. The victims make no complaints, fearing assassination.

MAY RECALL VATICAN ENVOY.

French Government Circles Bitter at Protest Against Loubet's Visit. Paris, May 19.—Government circles are considering seriously whether the pope's protest against President Loubet's visit to Rome should not be followed by the recall of M. Nisard, the French ambassador to the Vatican. M. Delecluse will urge moderation, but owing to the bitterness aroused the government may be compelled to take decisive action.

Balloon Battle Hinted.

St. Petersburg, May 19.—A number of war balloons, it is declared, were sent to Port Arthur on what is officially called the "ammunition train," which was pushed thru just before the strong- hold was invested by the Japanese armies. "If the Japanese try to drop balloons over Port Arthur and drop explosives on the fortress," an officer said yesterday, "the world will hear of the first battle in the air."

13 in Yale Commons; Resigns.

WISCONSIN FOR REVISION

Regular Republican Convention Favors Changes in Schedules Where Trusts Are Protected

LA FOLLETTE IS RENOMINATED

The Regular Convention Finishes Up Its Labors, Adopting Resolutions and Naming a State Ticket—Anti-Third Termers Hold a Separate Convention—Senator Spooner Will Speak.

Madison, May 18.—The republican convention attended by LaFollette delegates opened at 9:40 this morning. Chairman Chynoweth of the resolutions committee, presented the resignation of Charles F. Pfister, of Milwaukee, from the committee. Fred C. Lorenz was named to fill the vacancy. The report of the committee was signed by eight members, three having failed to attend the meeting. The platform strongly indorses the policy and administration of Roosevelt and LaFollette.

A meeting of Cook delegates was held this morning to determine their attitude relative to LaFollette and anti-third termers. It is announced they would not give recognition to LaFollette gathering by being present as Cook men and that not until the legal right of the Baensch delegates from the counties in question was determined would they sit in the anti-third term convention at the Fuller opera house.

"The platform has this to say on the tariff: "We firmly adhere to the fundamental republican doctrine of protection to American labor and believe that the aim of the truly protection policy should be to stimulate competition in the home market and not undermine it by favoring trust combinations.

"We therefore believe in readjustment of tariff schedules in all cases where protection is employed for the benefit of capital and to the injury of the consumer and working man.

Support is pledged to the interstate commerce commission, and President Roosevelt, in his efforts to secure relief from the increasing burdens imposed upon the people by public service corporations.

The platform was adopted unanimously. The roll call showed 58 1/2 delegates present.

Governor LaFollette was renominated by acclamation.

The rest of the state officers now holding offices were voted upon collectively and unanimously renominated.

THE RUMP CONVENTION.

Madison, May 19.—M. G. Jeffris, of Rock county, called the temporary anti-third term organization to order. Thirty Cook delegates from Winnebago, Grant, Adams, and Johnson counties were present. The report of the credentials committee were adopted, the members finding the delegates from the contested counties were entitled to seats. A committee composed of Governor Edward Scofield, ex-Governor Upham, and C. C. Rogers left the hall amid cheers to invite Senator Spooner and Quaries to attend the convention and participate in the deliberations.

The temporary organization was made permanent and the chair announced that Senator Spooner and Quaries had consented to appear and speak before the convention when the report of the committee on resolutions is read.

The convention adjourned until this afternoon.

ROOSEVELT AS A BOLL-WEEVIL

Governor Vardaman's Latest Picture of President as Political Pest. New Orleans, May 19.—He is a veritable political boll- weevil, pregnant with evil, devoid of redeeming vice or a compensating virtue."
