

Successful Turkey Farm. A turkey farmer who has had great success in his business recently revealed some of his trade secrets. Pointing to a small mill wherein a petroleum engine chug-chugged vigorously, he said: "In that mill the feed for my 2,000 turkeys is ground. The whole secret of successful turkey raising lies in abundant feeding. It keeps six men busy feeding my birds. "They are fed five times a day and each turkey gets as much as he can hold. Carrots boiled in lard and crushed barley and milk are very good fatteners, and the birds stuff themselves with them. Then, the last thing before going to roost, they eat all the oatmeal porridge and buttermilk they can find room for. "Cocks cost more than hens on the market because they are harder to raise. If they get together they fight and kill one another, and they eat, furthermore, five times as much as a hen. "A cock, three hours before killing, is made to swallow a half-pint of vinegar. Those Sun Spots. The sun, so far as the earth is concerned is the busiest thing known. It is also the most important. It is the source of direct and indirect heat and light. The straining of its light and heat thru a few more miles of atmosphere makes the difference between winter and summer. When it takes to performing in ways of its own, earth in immediate inquiry. For it can do nothing by which mankind is not affected.

There is now visible on the sun's disc a great gulf running down several hundreds of miles into its vitals and estimated to be 30,000 miles across. The little earth, a ball about 8,000 miles thru, could be dropped down the middle of this and not come within 11,000 miles of touching its sides anywhere. Even bodies the size of the earth could be similarly dropped with three thousand miles to spare all around.

The sun turns about on its axis once in from twenty-five to twenty-seven days, there being a more rapid rotation at its equator than further north or south. The spot now visible, will, therefore, disappear behind the face of the sun visible to us within a few days, to reappear again in about two weeks on the other side.

Any optician or instrument maker will sell you two strips of deeply colored glass, which can be fastened by rubber bands over the large end of the open glasses when it is desired to see the spot.

We are in one of the periods, recurrent every eleven years in which the most sun spots are to be seen. With the spots come electric storms and magnificent exhibitions of the aurora borealis, and these last are especially worth looking for every clear night, if you happen to be out, or by going to the northern windows of your house after you have turned out the lights within; they are too dim to be seen otherwise.
