BALLOTS PLACED ON INSPECTION

City Clerk Will Have Tickets For City Election Ready on Saturday

VOTERS MAY STUDY THEM

Peterson Heat, Light & Water Company informs City Clerk That It Will be Ready to Begin Work of Building Immediately, if Franchise Carries—Egermayer Has a Word.

City Clerk L. Derby will have ready for the inspection of the voters next Saturday, at his office, samples of the ballots that will be used at the city election next Monday. The voters will be given a time to inspect and study the ballots, as the law provides. The ballots will at this time be open to correction if any mistakes may have crept into the work of compilation. It would be well for people who are not versed in the correct manner of voting, or for those who do not understand just what is required in making ballots, to call at the clerk's office and study the ballots, which are this year quite complicated.

City Clerk Derby received this morning from the Peterson Heat, Light and Water Company a letter informing him that the company had made its arrangements so that work would be commenced at once in the building of hot water heating plant here, providing the franchise ordinance carries at the special election on Monday, held in conjunction with the regular city election. The voting for any kind of a special tax, which the franchise ordinance asks is that it be given the right by the electors, as the law requires, to construct and operate a hot water plant, and furnish heat to people who may wish to install the same in their homes. The franchise, as heretofore stated, is not an exclusive one, as the company does not ask it. It simply asks the right to do business. Hon. Sidney A. Foster and ex-Governor Frank D. Jackson, of Des Moines, are interested in the project.

Egermayer Has a Word. J. H. Egermayer, who is in the majority race, presents a communication to the T.-R. today, in which he emphatically denounces the story that he is not in the race to stay, and will withdraw at the last moment. Mr. Egermayer's communication is as follows:

Editors Times-Republican: I am very much surprised to find that Mr. Daly's supporters are still claiming to voters that I intend to withdraw in favor of Mr. Daly. The purpose of this campaign is to elect a mayor, and I want my supporters to know that I stated positively, several weeks ago, at a mass meeting, that I was not in sympathy with the kind of politics that certain party sought to play, when a resolution providing for a steering committee was introduced, and that I was not in the market for eleventh hour political deals. I wish it distinctly understood that I never put any word in my mouth that I have made no fight against Mr. Daly, either personally or concerning his published or private utterances, assuming that the professed neutrality of his workers was in good faith.

I am informed, however, that two of Mr. Daly's campaign managers have been very busy trying to get several rookbacks out against me and in one case sought to procure a signature to a prepared statement. The public, it is claimed by several parties, on Saturday night, will be informed by these gentlemen in true rookback style, concerning me. It is also reported that these men will issue a circular, with the idea of affecting my candidacy in favor of Mr. Daly. I only wish to warn my friends not to worry about such eleventh hour tactics. The public should remember that when these gentlemen start a rumor it should be presumed that it is done with Mr. Daly's sanction and coming at such a late date should be held as unworthy of consideration. "I have deposited with the cashier of the National bank a forfeit of \$250. to be given to any charitable institution in this city, in case any attempt is made on my part to throw my support to either Mr. Daly, Mr. Ingledue or any other candidate; said forfeit to be disposed of by either of these candidates against whom such attempt would be made. HIGH WATER DAMAGES BRIDGE. Linn Creek Bridge on Ketchum Street in Loss Portion of Abutment.

WORK OF SEASON IS SOON TO BEGIN

Central's Road and Bridge and Building Departments Planning Improvements

WILL BUILD MANY BRIDGES

Bridges to Be Rebuilt and Repaired Will Necessitate an Outlay of About \$100,000—Work to Begin April 1—Road Department Will Bring Italian Laborers to Line to Begin Monday.

Active preparations for the season's work are going on in the road and bridge and building departments of the Iowa Central, and the improvements and building will be begun next week and about April 1. The bridge and building department will devote the summer almost entirely to the building of new and the repairing of old bridges. Only a little new work will be done by the road department, which will devote the summer to finishing the work not completed last summer, and keeping up repairs on the right-of-way.

Superintendent of Bridges and Buildings J. F. Boleau has just completed a detailed estimate of the material and cost for the bridge work planned. It includes more than 100 bridges, which will either be rebuilt or repaired, and totals more than 12,000 feet of trestle work. All the bridges are of wood, supported by piling. The estimated cost, which is figured close, is over \$100,000. The largest single expenditure will be for the rebuild or repair of bridges which, for the year, are estimated to cost about \$15,000. The other bridges are scattered over the several divisions of the lines. As soon as the estimates are approved by the general officers work will be begun. The road department will be begun in the spring of April 1. Six bridge gangs are to be placed at work.

PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHT. Many Players Will Try For the High School Ball Team.

While only two players, Kirk and Lynch, remain of last year's high school baseball team, the club's prospects are brighter this spring than ever. The old men are few, there are more new candidates who will try for positions than ever before, and the scramble for places on the team promises to be lively. A committee appointed to canvass the vote of the members of the old team for the selection of a captain reported unanimously in favor of Carroll Kirk, who will have charge.

The new material available comes from the members of the second year players in the ward teams who have advanced to the high school, and boys who are attending school from the small towns of the county or country. Altogether there will be twenty-five or thirty players ready to begin practice when the outdoor work begins probably next week. More than a dozen are slated to try for infield positions, and fully as many aspire to the outfield. Carroll Kirk will probably do most of the pitching, also one or two others may develop to help out.

The schedule of games is now being arranged with schools of the state. The games are to be so planned that the last home game will be played here before the league season opens.

ASKS \$10,000 FOR LOSS OF THUMB

E. M. Foley, of Delmar, Brings Personal Injury Suit Against R. A. Elzy

PROTECTED BY BOND COMPANY

Claimed in Petition That Foley Sustained Permanent Injury by Being Caught in the Gearing of Steam Shovel While Working Near St. Charles, Ill.—Negligence Is Alleged.

Claiming negligence and carelessness on the part of defendant's superintendent, as the cause of losing a thumb, and being permanently disabled, E. M. Foley, living at Delmar, has caused to be filed in the district court a petition in which he asks \$10,000 damages for R. A. Elzy, for personal injuries alleged to have been sustained while working for Mr. Elzy at St. Charles, Ill., last August. Mr. Elzy, however, is fully protected in the action by a bonding company.

The plaintiff alleges that he was employed by Mr. Elzy as crane man, and while so employed he was instructed to repair the hoisting chain, which operates the shovel, by Mr. Elzy's superintendent, Frank Chaney. While so doing the engine was started and he was caught in the gearing, and was lacerated and torn and bruised and suffered the loss of his right thumb. He claims to be permanently disabled for future work.
