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A FIRM TONE IN WHEAT

Buying of July by Commission Houses and Shorts Caused Strong Market

THE DAMAGE REPORTS HELPED

The Market Increased in Strength as Session Advanced and Closed Over a Cent Higher—Small Receipts Had a Bullish Effect on Corn Which Closed Higher.

Chicago, April 13.—Buying of July by commission houses and shorts created a firm tone in wheat today.

The fear of possible damage to the fall sown crop was the principal factor in the situation. July opened at 87 1/2 and advanced to 87 3/4.

The market increased in strength on the reports of damage to fall sown crop. May closed 1 1/2 higher at 1.16 1/2.

Continued small receipts had a bullish effect on corn. Shorts were moderate buyers. July opened at 48 1/2.

Corn closed almost at the highest point of the day, July at 48 1/2 @ 48 3/4. Oats were firm. July opened at 30.

Notwithstanding the moderate decline in live hogs a steady tone prevailed in provisions.

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CATTLE RULED LOWER

Heavy Receipts and Poor Demand Caused a Decline in Prices Today

MOST KINDS WERE 10 LOWER

Commoner Sorts Were Fully 25 to 25 Below Monday's Prices for Those Grades—Hogs Have Maintained High Prices in Spite of Liberal Receipts—5 Lower Today.

Chicago, April 13.—Cattle—With unexpected heavy receipts and poor demand prices for the bulk of good cattle were 10 lower today.

Commoner sorts were fully 25 to 25 below Monday's prices for those grades. Hogs have maintained high prices in spite of liberal receipts—5 lower today.

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INTERURBAN PROJECT

Party of St. Louis Capitalists, Headed by David R. Francis, Visits Ottumwa

PROMOTING ELECTRIC LINE

An Interurban Railway Between Ottumwa and Oskaloosa is Talked Of—The Scheme Has Been Talked Of for Several Years and Appears to Have Chance for Success.

Ottumwa, April 13.—David R. Francis, president of the St. Louis world's fair, and John Scullin, president of the St. Louis & North Arkansas Railroad Company, headed a party of eight St. Louis capitalists who visited Ottumwa yesterday with a view of investing \$500,000 in the proposed Ottumwa-Oskaloosa Interurban Electric Railway Company.

The party arrived in this city on the Wabash yesterday morning in President Scullin's private car from St. Louis and returned to that city last night.

A conference between the St. Louis men and the officials of the Ottumwa Traction Company and representatives of the Oskaloosa plant was held yesterday morning at the Ballingal hotel.

After the conference the party was shown over the street railway system in the city and then entered automobiles and were shown over a portion of the road on which it is proposed that the new railway should leave Ottumwa.

After luncheon at the Ballingal another conference was held. After a dinner given last night by Major Samuel Mahon the visiting party started for St. Louis.

The project of an interurban line between Ottumwa and Oskaloosa has been under way for several years. It is proposed to run the railway from Ottumwa on the north side of the Des Moines river, following the river for some distance. Then the line will strike off and run thru Kirksville, then to Wright, and from there direct into Oskaloosa.

The local promoters of the enterprise, of which Harry E. O'Neil, and J. F. Springfield are the heads, have already secured a right of way for the line and have closed up all other matters so that practically nothing remains but to begin work of construction.

Were Favorably Impressed.

Just what conclusions were reached at the meeting held here yesterday is not known, but it is understood that the St. Louis men were favorably impressed with the proposition. It is understood that the new company proposes capitalizing at \$750,000. Of this amount \$250,000 is to be raised by Ottumwa and Oskaloosa capitalists and bonds issued to the amount of \$500,000, which will be taken up by the St. Louis capitalists.
