Young Man Named Reid Cuts His Throat When Arrested For Alleged Forgery

**ATTORNEY FINDS HIM LIFELESS**

Asked Officer for Permission to Go to Room in Hotel and Receiving Permission Quickly Ended His Life—Cedar Rapids Woman Commits Suicide—Crime at Muscatine.

Goldfield, Aug. 22.—Tom Reid, aged 25, committed suicide at the Beach Hotel in this city this morning while under arrest for forging a \$75 note in this city Saturday. The suicide occurred about 10 o'clock. Reid had asked Constable Hinton to leave to go to his room at the hotel for a moment, which was granted. Five minutes later his attorney went to the room and found Reid dead. He had cut his throat from ear to ear with a razor.

The officers have found traces of him in Cedar Rapids, Davenport and other cities, from time to time, since April, but he always managed to elude them.
