At the time Sedgwick was going up Parkin was coming down, and when his pals began to tally Parkin took the opposition into camp by closing them out without another tally. Boone scored first in the fourth. Meek, first up, broke out a double. Lally's grounder put him to third, and he counted on Benson's single. Another score was taken by Boone in the fifth, on Bassy's two-bagger and Fleming's single. After that round Boone never had a chance to count. Fisher's single being the only hit that broke the monotony of the outs.

After Hoy had fanned as an opener for the sixth, the Grays got away. Brown walked, and Kayler broke out a double, Brown going to third. Meek threw the ball away into the outfield. In an attempt to shear Kayler at second, while Brown romped home with the first tally. Krueger fanned, but Bruggeman smote a single, Kayler crossing, Tally two, and the score tied. Boone blanked the Grays in the seventh, but the visitors got away with one more tally in the eighth, and still another in the ninth. Kayler, first up, hit, advanced on Krueger's out, and tallied on Bruggeman's second pinch hit, beating the throw-in from the field to the plate by a close margin. In the ninth, Sedgwick, named Hoy, and Brown drove past Bassy in center. Hoy galloping home. Brown worked into a hot double on Lally's drive to first in the ninth, and the game was over. 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
