The council fire of the Great Council of Iowa, Improved Order of Red Men, for the twenty-second great sun session, of the reservation of Iowa, was kindled on the hunting grounds of Chippewa Tribe, No. 40, in this city, at the 9th run, rising of the sun, today. Braves from the many different tribes of the Iowa reservation were in attendance at the council when the fire was first kindled, and others, whose ponies could not travel the long distance in time to witness the lighting, will reach the local hunting grounds before the embers have died away. The council fire will be extinguished on the 11th sun of traveling moon G. S. D. 414, at the setting of the sun, or Wednesday night. In addition to the great council of the Red Men their squaws are also in

The Morning Session.
The opening session of the great council this morning began at 9 o'clock in the wigwam of Chippewa tribe. A procession, headed by the Red Men band of Hittman, was formed at the Pilgrim, and the members of the different tribes marched in a body to the Red Men's hall. Mayor O. L. Ingledue cordially welcomed the delegates on behalf of the city. Mr. Ingledue said: "To the Great Chiefs and Representatives of the Great Council of Iowa of the Improved Order of Red Men Gentlemen: In the days of the early settlements in this country it was customary for each little village to have some means of defending its inhabitants against the incursions of the hostile red men from the surrounding forests. Sometimes the settlements were surrounded with palisades and entered only thru gates carefully guarded. All contained some kind of a blockhouse built of stout heavy logs and timbers which was the last retreat of the intrepid pioneer. When this fortress was taken all was lost. "You have taken our outposts and finally captured our blockhouse, and I am here as the representative of the people of this community to surrender the settlement to you and ask only such terms of capitulation as you, in the magnanimity of your hearts, may be willing to grant to the most suppliant of captives. We are all yours, do with us as you will. The city, with all its plunder, is open to you. "You will, of course, by this time, observe that I am not a Red Man; that my language is not of the wigwam. 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
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
