Friends of the Chicago Merchant Have Given Up Hope For His Recovery

IS REPORTED DYING TODAY

Relatives Summoned to His Bedside This Afternoon at His Request to Await the End - Pneumonia the Cause of His Illness - Millionaire Merchant of Chicago.

New York, Jan. 15. - At 9:15 today the following bulletin on the condition of Marshall Field, was issued by physicians at the Holland House: "Near end of the seventh day of the disease, Field's condition remains critical. There is yet no improvement."

When this bulletin was issued, Field's pulse varied between 60 and 120.

New York, Jan. 15.-At 10 Stanley Field, a nephew of Marshall Field, said his uncle's condition was hopeless and his death appeared only a matter of hours.

Marshall Field's illness started with a cold. For three weeks before he left for New York he had complained of slight illness, but when he was suggested that he place himself under a physician's orders he made light of the attack and said it would soon pass away.

Mr. Field was anxious to be in New York and he informed Mrs. Field about ten days ago that he desired to go east the following Monday.

When the train was but a few hours out of Chicago Mr. Field began to breathe with difficulty. He showed distinct signs of distress, and Mrs. Field became alarmed.

Pittsburg was reached that evening, and the physician boarded the limited and made Mr. Field as comfortable as possible.
