WHIPPLE FAVORS AN INQUIRY It is Said a Bill Providing for a Commission With Power to Summon and Examine Witnesses Will Probably Be Introduced Soon - Some of Molsberry's Sensational Statements.

Des Moines, Jan. 27.—There are assurances that the senate committee on insurance will report to the senate a bill for an investigation of insurance companies. Senator Whipple, chairman of the committee is known to favor such action. There is a likelihood that the senate will pass some kind of a bill for an investigation. The stiff debate between Senator Molsberry and Senator Lewis yesterday has brought the insurance investigation to the forefront of discussion. It is recognized now by the leaders that the investigation cannot be made on the passage of a resolution. The appropriation of state funds to pay for the investigation will necessitate a bill. There are two possible courses on action in the investigation and one of these is outlined in the Molsberry resolution and the other in the Warren bill. The Molsberry resolution provides for the legislative commission to call witnesses and hear evidence on sworn testimony. The hearings would be public and the newspapers of the state would print many columns of the proceedings and disclosures. If there were any disclosures. Following the hearing of all this testimony and the bringing out of the facts from investigations the commission would formulate a report to the legislature and it would be at least largely on the facts uncovered by its own labors, and the facts in the possession of the state auditor would be used only incidentally.

The Warren bill provides that the commission shall advise with the state auditor, but does not provide that it can call witnesses and does not contemplate any public hearings. Under the Warren bill the commission would meet with the state auditor and go over the entire ground of the insurance business with him, having access to all the information in his office and to the use of his employees in looking up any additional facts the commission might desire light on. On the conclusion of its investigation it would formulate a report to the legislature with recommendations for such laws as it saw fit. But there would be no publicity pending its report such as has been the case in the past by the investigations there. There are plenty of advocates for the Molsberry idea that the commission should have the power to call witnesses and examine them. It is claimed by those who take that side of the question that the insurance companies would care nothing for an investigation that made nothing public except the recommendation of some laws on the conclusion of its labors. On the other hand they claim it would be a wholesome lesson to the insurance companies for the next twenty-five years and thru the columns of the newspapers the public would be given an education in insurance matters and valuable inside information to which they are entitled as policyholders.

MR. PERKINS SKINNED Senator Crossley Pays His Respects to the Oily Sage of the Sioux DEFENDS THE PRIMARY SYSTEM Declares if Perkins Desires to be Governor of the State He Should Have Confidence in the People If He Expects the People to Have Confidence in Him.

Des Moines, Jan. 27.—In his speech on the primary election bill Senator Crossley of Winterset, criticized George D. Perkins, candidate for governor, at a meeting of the Polk County Republican Club last evening. Senator Crossley's subject was "Government by the People," an address advocating the primary election bill that he has introduced in the general assembly.

After explaining that the primary election brought the nomination and election of the officials of the state and country down to the people, he said: "The slippery, oily sage of the Sioux says that the people should not have a primary election system. If he desires to be governor of the great state of Iowa he should have confidence in the people of the state. He must have confidence in the people if he expects the people to have confidence in him. 'And, here, gentlemen, I will say that others, the railroad attorneys, come to us and say that the anti-pass bill is all right and that they are glad we have it up and ready to be passed. Why? Because they, too, are thinking of that other measure, the measure that will do away with their great influence when the votes of the people and not the delegates are counted. Passes will be of little use then, for with the voice of the people heard the railroads could give away 10,000 passes a day, but they would not control the affairs of the state and country."

"During the past years, on one side or the other we have been hauled and thither by those professional political bosses, but they must soon see the hand writing on the wall. 'Some declare that the primary law, if adopted, would be placing Iowa with Massachusetts and other states of the south. This has been placed in resolutions before a republican convention, but it is not true. Iowa would not be a pioneer among the northern states should she adopt this measure. It is already in operation in such northern states as Massachusetts, Illinois, New Jersey, Wisconsin and Minnesota. It is not the southern system that Iowa is asked to adopt. 'The people have become educated so that the individual citizen has a right to say who his candidate shall be. I believe that if the people were given an opportunity to say, they would declare for the primary system. 'It is not a radical measure, as some are trying to make out. 'I have been, for reasons of my own that I shall not try to explain here, a 'standpater.' The primary bill is not a measure of 'the other side,' but it will do more to rid us of political corruption than anything else."

Senator Crossley closed by saying: "The republican party must look out for the interests of the people—if we do not some other party will. 'The people are not stupid in certain things just about so long and no longer. Due and timely warning is given to professional political bosses that they must get out of the way or be run over. 'Finally, let us have a government not for the people and of the people, but by the people, in its true sense. I want to say right here now that this fight for government by the people has only begun and there will be no let up until it has been secured in a wide primary election system, whereby the vote of every man cast for the delegates and candidates of his choice will be counted."

NEW CORN UNLOADER Frank Shannon, a Woodbury County Farmer, Has Invented An Ingenious Farm Implement That Bids Fair to Revolutionize the Manner of Hauling Corn. Special to Times-Republican. Sloan, Jan. 27.—Frank Shannon, a farmer of this county, is the inventor of a new farm implement which will revolutionize the manner of handling corn, and will supersede the scow shovel in unloading it as brought from the field, during the husking season. Mr. Shannon's implement is a corn elevator or unloader by means of which corn is unloaded from the wagon and elevated into the crib without a particle of manual labor on the part of the driver. When a load of corn has been hauled and is ready to be unloaded, the wagon is driven on to a platform which forms a part of the apparatus and so arranged that the horses stand on a tread power. As soon as the horses reach the tread power, the wagon stops, the machine begins operations and the corn is transferred by an endless chain device from the wagon to the crib and unloaded in five minutes. Mr. Shannon had one of the machines in operation on his farm this fall and it gave him good satisfaction, the only drawback, which was easily overcome, being that the horses were afraid of the noise made by the machine. As they could not get off the tread their apparent fright had a good effect, as it made the machine work all the more rapidly.

RIVER POWER COMBINE Talk of Monopolizing Sioux River's Power for Light Plants and Other Enterprises. EASTERNER PROPOSES SCHEME Business Men of Hawarden Are Interested and It is Probable That a Company Will be Organized - Both Iowa and South Dakota Towns Would be Benefited by Scheme. Special to Times-Republican. Hawarden, Jan. 27.—An eastern man, E. E. Carpenter, a man who builds railroads, has a scheme which he has been talking to the businessmen and others of this place. He proposes to monopolize all the power the Sioux river can furnish, between Sioux Falls, S. D., and Sioux City, Iowa. There are several good towns along the river both in Iowa and South Dakota, and they all are in need of light plants and power for other enterprises. Mr. Carpenter says that he will organize a company with local capital to utilize the power from the river and supply all these towns with it. A large number of small towns within ten to fifteen miles of the river in both directions could be supplied at a nominal cost, with light and motor power from the river towns. Several business men have become interested in the scheme, and it is likely that some plan will be made to form a company.

WILL GIVE ANNUAL PASSES. Burlington Railway Introduces New System to Conductors and Engineers. Burlington, Jan. 27.—The Burlington railway has introduced a new system of issuing passes to its conductors and engineers, which will go into effect immediately. The superintendent of each division will provide annual card passes for the men good at any time to any point on that division. Men who have been in the employ of the company for fifteen years or over will receive passes for themselves exclusively, while those who have been "rotting up and down the pike" for twenty-five years or over will receive passes entitling them to take their wives along with them on their trips. These "annuals" will only be good over the district in which they are issued. When an employe wishes to take a jaunt to any place outside the district he may put in an application for a trip pass, and in a few days will receive it. Trip passes will also be issued to members of the employe's immediate family as heretofore to any place on the system.
