WILL BUSSE HANG?

Dawson, Attorney for Busse, Asks for Reprieve, and Claims Merits of Case Are Not to Be Passed on by the Governor—Says Under Circumstances, Letter Had No Authority to Fix Date of Execution.

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CATTLE ABOUT STEADY

The Demand Was Rather Inactive Today, Trade Being Chiefly Local

SALES AROUND THE \$5 MARK

There Was a Decided Weakness in the Hog Trade, and the Market Today Was Fully Five Cents Lower—Little Change From Yesterday's Prices in Sheep, Demand Being Limited.

Chicago, April 19.—Cattle—Demand was not active, trade being chiefly local. Prices were about steady, and the bulk of sales were around the \$5.00 mark.

Exporters complain that they are losing money on the cattle they are shipping at present prices and will have to get them lower unless there is some advance soon on the other side of the water.

The receipts of 17,000 Wednesday made a total of 45,500 for the first three days this week, comparing with 38,143 a week ago, and this liberal increase in marketing has brought about a poor situation in the trade.

The trend of trade has been lower since last Wednesday, barring the firmer demand for export steers, which was met by a few sales.

There seems to be a greater demand for pork than for beef, but this is due partly to the fact that property in the south last year put people in that section of the country in better shape to buy meat from the north, and with the laboring classes pork is the principal article of diet.

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UNITED STATES EXPORTS

Those of Iron and Steel Manufactures Have Increased at a Great Ratio

Imports of Such, Decrease

Only in the Last Ten or Twelve Years Have Exports of Iron and Steel Manufactures Exceeded Imports of Like Commodities—Expansion of Pig-Iron Production.

Des Moines, April 19.—Iron and steel exports from the United States have increased tenfold since 1870, fivefold since 1890, and practically one-third since 1900, while for the first eight months of the current fiscal year they are practically six times as much as importations of like commodities during the same period.

It is only within the last ten or twelve years that exports of iron and steel manufactures have exceeded imports in the relative position of such imports and exports having been about coincident with the great expansion of pig iron production since 1890.
