

MORE TROUBLE AHEAD

Packers Find President Has a Big Club in Reserve in Their Case

SEQUEL TO NEILL REPORT

Action of the Packers in Demanding a Hearing Opens Up the Subject for the Other Side—The Embalming of Meat Likely to Be Given an Airing in Congress.

Washington, June 8.—There can be no complaint because the house committee on agriculture has arranged for hearings on the meat inspection question.

The Beverage amendment came up in the senate without any hearings having been had and there was no discussion of its provisions on the floor.

The senate in this instance acted like the house habitually does. It picked up the Beverage amendment and tacked it to a great appropriation bill without giving it the slightest consideration.

Mr. Proctor, chairman of the senate committee on agriculture, said a few days ago, in speaking of the senate's action, that he did not oppose the bill in the senate because it then seemed too late to do so, but he permitted it to go through, so far as his vote was concerned, assuming that it would be taken up in conference and there adjusted.

Will Be Drastic Laws.

The hearings before the house committee present the first official word congress has had on the subject aside from the message of the president and its accompanying report. The testimony thus far has been entirely ex parte, and in the interest of the packers.

Veteran Congressman From Ohio Pays a Fine Tribute to the Manliness and Simplicity of the President—Brundage Arraigns the Chief Executive.

Washington, June 8.—Representative Stephen Brundage, of Arkansas, bitterly assailed President Roosevelt in an angry speech in the house yesterday. When he had finished, General Grosvenor, of Ohio, arose, and, replying to Mr. Brundage, delivered himself of a defense of the nation's chief executive such as has seldom been heard in the halls of congress.

The war that the White House supplemental report deals directly with this phase of the question and that an abundance of testimony has been secured, makes it apparent that the beef packers are fooling with edged tools when they undertake to persuade congress to run counter to the beef inspection policy.

The president felt compelled to submit the first Neill-Reynolds report, the attitude of the house committee on agriculture being so antagonistic to the president's position on the Beverage amendment. He may also feel compelled to submit this supplement report.

It has been his policy to ignore the past misdeeds and hold the packers to strict accountability for the future, through stringent law. Their opposition to the passage of that law is what has compelled him to show his hand.

The president is taking this line of attack upon the beef trust, is, of course, not actuated by desire for revenge, or account of the Judge Humphrey decision. But if he were, his appetite for revenge would by this time be fully satisfied.
