

TURBINES FOR UNIVERSITY. Iowa River to be Harnessed for Use of Students. Special to Times-Republican. Dubuque, July 20.—Four new 100-horse power turbine mills are being manufactured in Dubuque for the Iowa State University.

The turbines will be placed on the bank of the Iowa river and will generate power for the university. The contract calls for the best type of turbines.

Two years ago the University of Iowa decided to utilize the water of the Iowa river, which flows in the rear of the university buildings.

A huge dam is being constructed, which will afford facilities for rowing, bathing, etc., as well as furnish water to operate the turbines to be placed by the Dubuque company.

Power Will Be ample. A great deal of the work of constructing the dam, making calculations, etc., has been done by the students of the university.

During the summer a score or more students are at work on the dam.

The Iowa river is a narrow stream, but has a swift current, and the power to be secured from the turbines will be ample to operate the machinery in the engineering department and to run the lighting machinery.

Moreover, it will give the students an opportunity to study this kind of power.

When the dam is completed it is expected that here will be a revival of boating at Iowa City. It is not unlikely that shell racing will be added, and that the University of Iowa will compete with other universities in that great sport.

The dam will make the river almost a half mile wide for a distance of a mile and a half. The course will be very convenient to the students, lying directly west of the university football field.

Grand Junction News. Special to Times-Republican. Grand Junction, July 20.—The ball game here between the Jefferson and Boone teams was quite a disappointment to Jefferson, losing the game 4 to 3.

This locality is having a rainy spell, while less than five miles northwest of Grand Junction it is dry and in the neighborhood of Scranton in this county, crops are needing rain badly.

A number of farmers, north and northeast of this place, have joined together in the construction of a drain, to serve as an outlet for the drainage of their lands, and are building an open drain that is four feet deep and eight feet wide at the surface.

They are spending their money to build a drain instead of costs to officers and editors, as is done under the law, for building county drains.
