MAN WITH HISTORY DEAD IN CHICAGO

Eugene Kraft, Until Recently a Printer of This City, Killed in Chicago

MEMBER OF TITLED FAMILY

Had Spent Two Years in Monastery, Was College Graduate, Master of Several Languages and Member of Wealthy and Titled German Family—Wife Living Here.

Eugene Kraft, a man with an interesting history and until recently employed in various printing offices in Marshalltown, is dead in Chicago.

Kraft left Marshalltown about two months ago, after a residence here of seventeen or eighteen years. For six years he was employed by the local German paper, the Beobachter, and later in other printing establishments of the city.

"Chicago, July 27.—From papers found in the possession of Eugene Kraft, whose body was discovered early today in the basement of 81 Wells street, the police believe the man was a Swiss army officer. It is also thought that he was related to Baron De Reding, of Germany.

APPOINTMENT TO BE MADE SOON Governor Will Name Col. Parker as Judge for Unexpired Term.
