VOTE IN THE CITY COMING IN SLOWLY

Election Very Quiet Considering Personal Campaign That Has Been Made

LATE VOTE WILL BE HEAVY

Rush at the Last Moment May Swamp the Election Boards—Vote Extremely Light in Fourth and Fifth Wards Up to 2 O'clock—Returns From State Will Be Slow Coming In.

The early vote today was extremely light, and there was not the excitement nor the interest shown that the increased registration indicated.

Considering the vigorous personal campaign made in behalf of Bradshaw of Toledo, for judge during the past few days, the interest in the election does not come up to expectations.

At 2 o'clock 219 votes had been cast in the First ward, out of about 600. Three years ago, when the last state election was held, a total of 524 votes were cast in this ward.

In the Second ward 350 votes had been polled prior to 2 o'clock, and it is expected that 600 or more will be cast, compared to 451 three years ago.

The counting of the votes tonight will be slow and the returns will be late coming in. Members of the election boards in this city say that they do not expect to be thru counting the ballots until Wednesday forenoon.

INCENDIARY FIRE RUINS RESTAURANT

Presence of Kerosene and Valuable Missing Give Evidence of Crooked Work

STOCK AND FIXTURES BURNED

Home Dairy Restaurant, Owned by Mesdames Andrews & Hoock, Ruined—Insured for \$500—Police Investigating—Fire in North Third Avenue Residence.

Fire shortly before midnight ruined the stock and fixtures of the Home restaurant, in the building at 204 East Main street.

Strong evidence was developed this morning that indicates the fire was of incendiary origin, and that an attempt was made to cover up a robbery.

There is also evidence that a quantity of kerosene was used, as a can containing oil, which had been purchased Monday was found empty and the aroma of the oil was apparent.

The restaurant was closed at 10 o'clock for the night, and the fire was discovered at 11:30 by passers-by. The department responded promptly, and the blaze spread so rapidly that both stock and fixtures were almost entirely ruined.

Mesdames Andrews and Hoock carried insurance for \$500, which will cover their loss, they say. The building is owned by Mrs. W. M. Sherlock. The store room was not greatly damaged and was amply insured.

Fire in a Residence. An overheated pipe in the residence at 111 North Third avenue ignited some matting that had been placed on the floor and threatened the destruction of the entire building.

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
