AN EDUCATION FOR EVERYONE

What Governor Cummins Thinks of the Correspondence Method

EXTRACT FROM HIS SPEECH
The Scranton Schools the Pioneer in This Method of Self Education - Practical and Saving-The Importance of Technical Training for a Successful Career.

The correspondence system of education, inaugurated and brought to its highest state of perfection by the International Correspondence Schools of Scranton, Pa., has taken a great hold upon the people. The reason is found in its great practicability and the saving effected thereby, enabling the working and poorer classes to obtain a technical education, one that will permit them to fit themselves to earn the expert's salary, while still earning a livelihood. Governor Cummins, in his speech before the Marshall County Farmers' Institute, held in this city January 24, 25 and 26, pointed out the value and importance of technical training and discussed the large part which the correspondence school is coming to fill in our system of education. He said in part:

"I said the other day before a meeting at Des Moines that I believe that there ought to be attached to the school at Ames a correspondence department. I have been criticized for some of that. I put it in my message and I have been assailed by some of the splendid educators of the state because I have done something that might lower the standard of education. I do not think so; I am in earnest. You know and I know how necessary it is that there shall be a general knowledge of the fundamental principles of agriculture. That has become so firmly planted in the minds of the people that I need not say anything to emphasize it. There are a great many of our boys, who cannot go to Ames, and there are a great many of our men of greater years, who ought to know these things, who cannot go to Ames. There seems to be an idea that when a fellow passes 20 or 22 he ought not to go to school. Now there are certain things that you have discovered in your institute that can be taught very well thru the medium of correspondence, and I think that you ought to insist that there shall be attached to the agricultural department at Ames a school of correspondence, or if our friends, the educators, object to that, perhaps I will call it a bureau of information, that would outline a course of study that would enroll old and young all over the state. Of course you will never reach the climax of education in that way. Of course the education you will receive will be superficial and inadequate, but you will discover that it will be a wonderful help to you.

"Do you know what the schools of correspondence are doing in this state? There is one school down at Scranton. It has at this time enrolled in the state of Iowa nearly 20,000 boys and girls and women, and while they will not become educated to any high degree in the course of study so outlined, they will, every one of them, be just a little better off because they have started in that way. Of course the education you will receive will be superficial and inadequate, but you will discover that it will be a wonderful help to you.

The International Correspondence School of Scranton has had fifteen years of successful correspondence teaching. Its students number over 950,000, from the laborer to the mechanic, superintendent and manager, which demonstrates the value of a technical education. Anyone who is in touch with the times knows that the demand of technically trained men greatly exceeds the supply.
