SMALL CITIES BENEFIT New Joint Freight Law Places Towns on Same Basis as Large Competing Points

COMMISSION HAS A BIG TASK Meets Soon to Work Out Schedules in Compliance With Statute Recently Enacted—Most Important Undertaking Since Commission Was Created—Equalities in Present Rates.

Des Moines, April 27.—When the railroad commission meets May 8 to take up the joint freight rate problem placed on its shoulders by the legislature it meets only to comply with the law, which requires that within ten days after the joint freight bill becomes effective the commission should fix a date not more than thirty days distant for beginning the task of putting in joint freight schedules.

Some years ago the railroad commission put in a joint freight rate schedule and it was knocked out by the railroads who carried the matter to the supreme court. The court knocked out the law because of a technicality, the railroad commission having failed to give the requisite number of days' notice to the railroads.
