TEN PULLED IN GAMBLING HOUSE

Otto Radloff's Place at 23 North Center Raided by Police Late Saturday Afternoon

HOUSE PAYS ALL THE FINES

Protection Guaranteed to Players Made Good by Proprietor, Who Puts Up \$98.50 to Seek for the Victims—Several Well-Known Young Men Included in the Arrests.

Chief of Police Nicholson, Sergeant Goodale and Officer Breckel raided a gambling joint at 23 N. Center St. late Saturday afternoon and placed all of the occupants of the place, ten in number, under arrest. Otto Radloff took the responsibility of the proprietorship of the resort, and in the police court, after all entered pleas of guilty, paid all the fines amounting, with costs, to \$98.50.

Nearly all of the men, when arraigned, gave assumed names. They were charged with frequenting a disorderly house and engaging in gambling and other disorderly conduct. The police not only effected a wholesale arrest, but captured the paraphernalia of the place, including a faro layout. Nothing but draw poker was in progress at the time of the raid, and not all of the men in the place were playing.

Those arrested, fined \$5 and costs, or \$9.85, were as follows: Arthur Harvey, alias Burt Williams, William Francis, A. B. Morgan, J. M. Brown, J. H. Watters, alias William Johnson, Herbert E. Black, alias J. E. Bacon, Arthur Ogden, alias G. W. McQuaid, Jack F. Birmingham, W. G. Herrick, alias James H. Bone-steel, Otto Radloff.

Only Half Owner, Says Radloff. In the police court Radloff testified to the officers that he was only half owner of the place, and that interested with him in its operation was Frank Dewey, a well known gambler. Mr. Dewey, later in the afternoon, stated that Radloff's assertion was false, and that he had not been concerned in the operation of the place for some time, having other interests that occupied all of his attention.

Gambling Must Stop. Mayor Ingledue informed the men before him that if they ever fell into his drag net again they would not get off so lightly. It was within his power to fine them \$100 and costs, but as this was the first offense he was willing to make the fines light. "Gambling has got to stop in Marshalltown," said the mayor to the men, and another offense will mean the limit.

Will Have Gambling Ordinance. Mayor Ingledue was surprised upon consulting the ordinances after the raid, to find that the revised ordinances of Marshalltown do not contain any section on gambling. Disorderly conduct and being inmates of a disorderly house was the only ordinance that covered the crime aside from the state law. The mayor did not care to wind the matter over to the grand jury on a first offense, although he stated in court that the county attorney could bring the matter before the grand jury and return indictments, as the evidence in the case is just as good when the next grand jury meets as it is now. The mayor requested City Solicitor Northup to prepare an ordinance covering gambling, to be presented before the council, at the attorney's earliest convenience. The paraphernalia will be destroyed after due process of law.

Brooke, superintendent of motive power and machinery, formerly master mechanic of the Iowa Central.

Mr. Everist has been in the employ of the Iowa Central since August, 1881, and for the past seventeen years has held a foremanship. For the past nine years he has been at the head of the car shops painting and for the eight years preceding was in charge of the engine painting work. He is also a well known musician, and has been identified with different band and orchestra organizations of the city for many years.

GOLF TOURNAMENT LAST WEEK JUNE

Dates of State Meeting Are Changed to Better Suit Many of the Players

TOURNEY BEGINS JUNE 24

Many of the Golfers Did Not Want to Be Away From Home Over the Fourth, and Meeting Had Been Announced for First Week of July—Qualifying Rounds June 25.

For the third time the date for the annual Iowa state golf championship tournament, to be played on the course of the local Country club, has been fixed. The last date, which is final, is the last week of June, beginning on the 24th. This week has been chosen by the officers of the state association, because so many protests were entered against holding the tournament the first week of July.

The first date chosen was the second week of July. Soon after it was announced the Trans-Mississippi association selected the same week for its tournament at Rock Island. The first week of July was then selected, but because it would take golfers away from their homes on the Fourth, the officers have been receiving many complaints and it was thought best to again change the date. The fear of a considerable decrease in the number of entries was the principal reason the date has been changed to the closing week of June.

"MAC" BADLY HURT

Attendance at First Games of League 3,000 More Than Last Year.

President Peckham of the Iowa State League, has just prepared a comparative statement of the attendance at the eight opening games of the league this year, also the attendance for the same games last year. The figures show an increase of more than 3,000 over the opening of the 1906 base ball year. Jacksonville leads this year, while Burlington was first last year. The figures for the two years are as follows:
