

A fish story that was not exactly a fish story, but rather a tale of tortoise fishing off the island of Barbados, has been told with great eclat by "Coal Oil Johnnie" Ruth and "Bill" Strickler, who recently made a trip to the British West Indies. The proofs of somebody's fishing at least, arrived yesterday, and are now on exhibition in Mr. Strickler's window. The trophies are two fine specimens of the tortoise, each weighing from seventy to seventy-five pounds, which Mr. Ruth and Mr. Strickler shipped to New York and had them made ready for exhibition. SIDEWALKS ORDERED IN. Council Says Lincoln and Lawrence Walks Must Be Laid. The city council Monday night ordered in sidewalks on the south side of Lincoln street between Second avenue and the alley east, and on the south side of Lawrence street between Third and Fourth avenues. The council eliminated the walk previously ordered in on the east side of Ninth street from Main to Church, and on the east side of Center from South street to the John Knorr property. Considerable discussion arose over the new walk ordered on South Second avenue, near Boone, as to whether it should be laid on the present grade or brought down to street level. Presently a motion to build the new walk on its present grade, but was ruled out of order because the mayor held that if the grade were already established the council had no power to change it unless by ordinance, and that if the walk was at present not at grade, the council has no alternative but to compel it to be built to grade. The mayor, city engineer and chairman of the streets and alleys committees were instructed to investigate the situation. CASE MAY NOT BE TRIED.
