### Good Demand From Shorts Creates Better Tone, After Weak Opening

CORN FOLLOWS WHEAT'S LEAD

Chicago, Dec. 27.—Wheat today opened weak, because of lower cables, but soon rallied on good demand from shorts. May opened at 1.06 1/2 to 1.06 1/4 and sold at 1.07. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago receipts were 460 cars.

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## HOGS GAIN 10 CENTS

### Demand Good For All Except Mixed Grades, Which Are Dull

#### CATTLE STILL REMAIN STEADY

#### Light Receipts and Poor Quality of Arrivals Create Fair Demand for Better Grades—Sheep 10 Cents Lower—Current Quotations in Chicago and Elsewhere.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—Cattle were nominally steady and receipts were light and of rather poor quality. The demand was fair for good grades. Hogs were stronger and 10 cents higher. Mixed grades were dull, but demand for other kinds were very good. Sheep were 10 cents lower.

Traders said the big run Thursday and hard smashing of prices may check excessive marketing early next week. After the slump Thursday it would seem prudent for shippers to hold Monday's receipts down to moderate the market. Another big supply will only have the effect of further reducing the price range.

Owing to a heavy proportion of underweight and pig stuff, it is being discriminated against. It is being sold at a price which may be regarded as a new deal. Shipping outlets for this light stuff have contracted visibly, and instead of buying mixed loads carry-over light ends, straight packers insist on sorting off the undesirable element. When separated it has to sell on its merits, the result being that the spread has widened considerably. Good butchers, strong-weight shippers and weighty mixed do not look much lower than a week ago, while other grades are 15 to 25c lower, indications are that the spread will widen if the country continues its policy of persistently shooting in light stuff.
