

ROACH TELLS OF "BILLY" SUNDAY

Muscatine Lumberman Addresses Large Crowd in Evangelistic Interests

"GREATEST PREACHER OF DAY"

So Thinks One of Evangelist's Converts—Roach Declares That Sunday is Not a Graft, and Says He Ought to Know—Financial Campaign Begins Today.

W. L. Roach, millionaire lumberman, and a prominent citizen of Muscatine, yesterday told Marshalltown what he knew of "Billy" Sunday. The picture Mr. Roach painted differed materially from some of the portraits that have been held up before the public view, and a new conception of Sunday, the man, was gained by many.

"The greatest preacher on the platform today," was the way Mr. Roach put it, in speaking of Sunday.

Mr. Roach spoke of Sunday's sensationalisms and the evangelist's slang, but said they were greatly overbalanced by his many sermons in which the best use of the English language was made. Mr. Roach said that the slangy and sensational sermons were comparatively few, and that no preacher, of whom he knew, had better command of the king's English than Sunday. Neither did he know of any preacher who could preach a more tender or pathetic sermon. As an illustration reference was made to Sunday's sermon on the twenty-third psalm.

Sunday Not a Graft.

Mr. Roach dwelt on his own impressions of Sunday, as he knew him personally, and in this connection took occasion to disclaim the statement often made, that "Sunday is a graft." Mr. Roach said he felt qualified to deny that Sunday was a graft, because up to the Muscatine campaign Sunday had never had as large an individual contribution as given him by the speaker.

Mr. Roach made the assertion that those who most loudly accused Sunday of being a graft were the ones who had not given him a cent.

Gives Personal Testimony.

Mr. Roach launched into an old-fashioned Methodist "experience meeting," by giving his testimony. He told of his conversion under Sunday's preaching, and how his attitude towards worldly things had changed.

Mr. Roach, while not an orator, is a decidedly pleasing speaker. His address was what might have been looked for from an educated business man. The church was completely filled by an audience that was generally sympathetic with the testimonial to Sunday. Commandant C. C. Horton, of the soldiers' home, who is a warm, personal friend of Mr. Roach, and had known him as a resident of Muscatine, introduced the speaker both at the evening meeting, and the men's meeting at the east court room in the afternoon.

Financial Campaign Begins.

The Sunday campaign began in earnest today following a 7 o'clock breakfast at the Soddard, given by the evangelistic committee. Announcements were made by the various chairmen, and the representatives of the different churches had made a division of the list, looking toward raising the guarantee fund of \$5,000 in stock subscriptions. The work of placing the stock is in charge of Rev. James McGee. The solicitations are to be made within the church membership of the city.

ROACH AT MEN'S MEETING.

Goodell Nails Iowa Falls Story on Reward for Convert.

Mr. Roach addressed an audience of men that filled the east court room Sunday afternoon, the meeting being the regular Sunday service of the Railroad, Y. M. C. A. He spoke along the lines of his knowledge of Sunday and his work, and gave his testimony as to what Sunday had done for him.

Former Secretary John A. Goodell, of the Y. M. C. A., took occasion to refute, absolutely and unqualifiedly, the newspaper story emanating from Iowa Falls, in which it was said that \$50 would be paid for a single Sunday convert now an active worker in the church.

Mr. Goodell said he had taken the trouble of investigating the statements made, while in Iowa Falls recently, and declared that the story was a myth. He was ready to take the \$50 if he could find who offered it, but said that the offer had never been made. Furthermore, Mr. Goodell declared, there were hundreds of people at work in the Iowa Falls churches who were Sunday converts.

Mr. Roach, on Sunday morning, addressed a good-sized audience at the Presbyterian church.

NEWELL TO INDEPENDENCE.

Knoxville Patient From This City is Adjudged Insane.

Dan Newell, who was committed to the state hospital for inebriates at Knoxville from this county a few weeks ago, has been sent to the insane asylum at Independence. It was found impossible to care for Newell at Knoxville, and he was given a hearing on an insanity charge and adjudged insane. An information charging insanity was filed against Newell here by his step-son, James Thome, but Newell was discharged.


