WEATHER AND CROP BULLETIN SHOWS ABNORMAL WEATHER CONDITIONS PREVAIL

NO PROGRESS IN FIELDS DURING PAST SEVEN DAYS

Coldest April So Far Since 1881, With Rains, Snow and Winds—Oats Up in the Southern Section of State—Conditions in Central and Northwest Iowa.

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, April 20.—The weekly weather and crop bulletin, the second issued this season, says:

The weather during the past week has been abnormally cold, wet and cloudy. Freezing temperatures occurred in all parts of the state, the minimum ranging from 30 degrees in the southeastern to 18 degrees in the northwestern counties on the 13th.

North Central District. Worth (Northwood)—Rain .90; no farm work done as yet; five inches of snow fell on Wednesday.

Central District. Grundy (Grundy Center)—Rain 2.15; the week was wet and cloudy, with frequent rain or snow; later part considerably warmer and seeding is nicely under way.

Boone (Woodward)—Weather conditions unfavorable for seeding; frequent rains have made it impossible to get in the fields, but most of oats sown.

Marshall (Marshalltown)—Rain 2.65; the rains have stopped seeding; most of the farmers are plowing sod ground; the new clover is looking good.

Northwest District. Lyon (Newbold)—Rain .27; preparation of ground for seeding was begun on the 5th, but 9 inches of snow the following day delayed work till the 12th.

West Central District. Sac (Sac City)—Rain .38; frequent showers and one snow storm made conditions unfavorable for farm work; probably 50 per cent of ground sown; hay and rough feed scarce and high.

Williamsburg. F. O. Harrington organized a fishing party one day last week and caught all of the gold fish in his pond. There were 4,000 of them, 1,000 were shipped to the Iowa Seed Company, of Des Moines; 2,000 were put in a tank for future sale, and the rest were put back in the pond.

Muscatine. Muscatine is just nine thousand, seven hundred and five dollars richer as the result of the water accomplished by a man who will do so now. Competent carpenters are going to that work as rapidly as it opens, and there seems to be a large amount of it in Des Moines.

Jefferson. Three cases of beer, a case of fine whiskey, a mad porter, a delayed train, thrown from its schedule, and the whole train crew in an uproar, happened Thursday at the Milwaukee depot when Attorney R. G. Howard took charge of things for a few minutes and had the liquor taken from the buffet car and taken down in an auto.

Cedar Rapids. An unusual spectacle was witnessed when a youngster 13 years of age staggered down Clinton street, under the influence of liquor. He was barely able to keep the sidewalk and although harmless, was quarrelsome. He offered to "kick" Dr. Henry G. Fox of the university school of music. 

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Articles of Incorporation. ARTICLE I. The name of this corporation shall be the Feeders and Feeders' Exchange Company, and its principal place of business shall be Laurel, Marshall county, Iowa.

ARTICLE II. The object of this company is buying, feeding, selling and shipping live stock and for betterment of the live stock industry.

ARTICLE III. The capital stock of this company shall be Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each. These shares to be non-assessable.

ARTICLE IV. The indebtedness of this company shall not exceed one-sixth of its capital stock.

ARTICLE V. The officers of this company shall be a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, manager and one director, the five shall constitute the board of directors who shall be elected at the regular annual meeting to be held at Laurel, Iowa, on the first Saturday of March each year.

ARTICLE XII. The private property of the stockholders shall not be held for any debts of the company.

ARTICLE XIII. The officers of this corporation shall be Jno. E. Smith, president; vice president, C. F. Toedt; secretary, D. C. Maytag; treasurer, John S. Paul, the manager is also secretary, and the director is G. E. Paul, who shall hold their offices until the first annual meeting in 1910.

ARTICLE XIV. This corporation shall commence business on the 1st day of March, 1909, and terminate on the 1st day of March, 1929 unless sooner terminated by the vote of two-thirds of all shareholders voting in favor of such dissolution.
