GLICK TOUTED AS FRIDAY'S WINNER

INTERSCHOLASTIC FIELD MEET IS CREATING UNBOUNDED ENTHUSIASM.

FOUR SCHOOLS ARE LOOKED TO BE STRONG

Rogers School Has Beautiful T.-R. Silver Trophy Cup All But Won for All Time, But Is Not Likely to Complete the Capture—List of Entrants.

The annual interscholastic track and field meet of the graded schools of the city, which will take place at the fair grounds Friday afternoon, is creating unbounded enthusiasm in every school in the city. Boys and girls are wearing their colors on the streets, and the only event discussed is the Friday meet. The girls of the schools are spending their odd time making pennants, and a prettier sight will not be witnessed in many a day than that which will greet the public Friday afternoon.

The Glick school is touted as the winner of the meet, even though the Rogers has the trophy—the beautiful silver cup offered by the Times-Republican—all but won. Rogers has won two years in succession, and according to the terms of the gift the school winning the trophy three times in succession is to have the cup as its property.

Rogers Not So Strong This Year. The big winners of the Rogers team during the past two years are now of high school age, and in the school are more of the younger boys who have not had experience in track events. On the Glick school team are Carl Scott and Warren Stevens, who will do much toward winning if Glick is the victor.

Four of the schools are expected to show up strong, the Glick, Arnold, Rogers and Abbott.

Classified Teams by Weight. The teams of the different schools are to be classified by weight, Class A being the smaller boys, seventy pounds and under; Class B, seventy to eighty-five; C, eighty-five to 105; D, over 105.

Rogers Gets Place of Honor. In the grand stand the Rogers school delegation will have the seats of honor, and will be given the best section, by virtue of that school's winning the meet last year. The Woodbury will have the next pick of seats, and the Arnold third.

SALOON CASES GO OVER UNTIL FRIDAY

CONTINUANCE GRANTED BY JUDGE PARKER ON EGER-MAYER'S REQUEST.

WAS DELAYED IN PREPARING CASE

Cases, by Which It is Sought to Close North First Street Places by Injunction, Set for Hearing Friday Morning—Egermayer Gives Reasons for Asking Continuance.

On the motion of County Attorney J. H. Egermayer, the cases by which it is sought to enjoin the Bernstein and Crinklaw saloons, at 12 and 17 North First street, which were set for trial before Judge J. M. Parker in the district court this morning, were continued until Thursday morning.

Mr. Egermayer sought a continuance because he was not ready. He said his absence from the city with Mrs. Egermayer, who has just recently undergone an operation, was one reason, and another was that he was in correspondence with the attorney general's office regarding two vital law points involved in the cases, the opinions on which he had not yet received.

Judge Parker, who is anxious to get the cases started, owing to the term being so far advanced, suggested to Mr. Egermayer that he communicate with the attorney general today by telephone and be prepared to try the cases in the morning. Mr. Egermayer thought this could be done. The cases were therefore set for hearing at 9 o'clock in the morning.
