BERTHA ROBERTS RETURNED HOME

GIRL WHO DISAPPEARED FROM HOME FOUND NORTH OF THE CITY.

SPENT THE DAY IN AN EMPTY HOUSE MILE AWAY

Found by Farmer, Hatless and Scantly Clad, as She Was Walking Along Country Road—No Satisfactory Reason Given For Her Going Away—None the Worse for Exposure.

Scantly clad, hatless, her hair disheveled and filed with chaff and straw, Miss Bertha May Roberts, the young woman who disappeared so suddenly from the home of Mrs. Robert J. Clark, 410 Woodbury street, was found north of the city late Monday afternoon. A farmer met the bareheaded woman as he was going home. He telephoned police headquarters and Deputy Marshal Clark went with the patrol, found her, and returned her to Mrs. Clark about 5 o'clock.

Spent Day in Empty House. According to the girl's story she spent the day in an empty house about a mile north of town, near the Third avenue road. This detail is about the only satisfactory part of the account of the day's absence that the girl will give. She knows of no reason why she went away. Her answer to Mrs. Clark, when asked why she left was "I don't know." She said she had been "nowhere" and had gone away for "nothing." The girl said she had made up her mind to return home and was on her way when the police met her.

WHAT CHEER VETERAN DEAD.

Albert J. Van Patten, Passes Away at Soldiers' Home. Albert J. Patten, a resident of What Cheer, who came to the soldiers' home on Jan. 18 last, died at 10:55 this morning of liver and stomach disease. Mr. Van Patten was 67 years old, and was a native of New York. He served in Company I, Seventh Missouri cavalry, and Company D, Eleventh Illinois cavalry. His first enlistment was at Peoria, Ill., June 3, 1861, and his discharge followed June 14, 1864, at St. Louis. His second enlistment was at Peoria, Jan. 20, 1866, and he was discharged on Sept. 30 of the same year. He was a widower and is survived by four children: Henry and George Van Patten and Mrs. Julia Danner of What Cheer; and Mrs. Ella Pollock, living in Nebraska.

TWO CHILDREN ILL; HOME IS DESTROYED

ONE MISFORTUNE FOLLOWS ANOTHER AT HENRY CLARE HOME IN VIENNA TOWNSHIP.

CHILDREN MOVED AS FLAMES LAP UP HOME

House and Contents Are Destroyed, and Little Insurance is Carried—Sick Children Driven in Bob Sled to Relative's Home Between Conrad and Beaman.

One misfortune following another appears to be the fate of the Henry Clare family, well-known residents of Vienna township, three and one-half miles north of Green Mountain. While two of the little sons of Mr. and Mrs. Clare were lying sick of pneumonia, one dangerously, the home caught fire between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning, and was burned to the ground, together with most of its contents. The fire originated from a defective stove, and the blaze had made such headway before it was discovered that only a few of the contents could be saved by the neighbors. Mr. and Mrs. Clare turned their undivided attention to their two sick sons, Albert, aged 5, and Tony, aged 3. Albert's condition has been considered "quite critical for several days. The little fellows were bundled up, placed in a bobbed, and driven to the home of Mr. Clare's brother, Frank Clare, about midway between Conrad and Beaman. As yet it is not known whether the excitement or moving will have any ill effects or not. The loss on the Clare home and contents will be about \$1,500. Mr. Clare carried \$500 insurance on the dwelling, but nothing on the contents.


