PROUTY'S CAMPAIGN CANDIDATE AGAINST HULL OPENS HEADQUARTERS IN DES MOINES.

EFFORT TO TURN LABOR TO HULL IS FAILURE

Special to Times-Republican. Des Moines, Feb. 2.—Judge Prouty has opened headquarters in the Fleming block and has virtually placed his campaign in the hands of a committee of live republicans.

In case Judge Roberts, of Ottumwa, gives the game for attorney general it will greatly increase the chance of having the matter thrown into the state convention.

The state pharmacy commission held a session this week for examination of applicants. Already there is some activity with regard to the next appointment. The term of I. W. Clements, of Iowa county, expires in April.

Des Moines republicans are becoming a little nervous over the situation as to the pension office and are wondering if they are to be punished for the attitude of the majority as a whole in the state.

Grundy Center, Feb. 2.—The fourth of a sequence of fires, all connected in some way with the name of Morrison, occurred last night at the Harry Morrison farm, when a large barn, with seventeen cattle, seven horses and farm machinery and grain contained therein, was totally destroyed.

The origin of the fire last night at the Harry Morrison place is a mystery. Mr. Morrison and the hired man were in town at the time and there was no one about the place so far as known.
