STRIKERS PROMOTE SMALL-SIZED RIOT

POLICE CALLED TO QUELL DISTURBANCE CAUSED BY TELEPHONE OPERATORS.

GIRLS TRY TO PREVENT NIGHT FORCE WORKING

Grab Mrs. Carrie Kirkpatrick as She Goes to Enter Building, and Police Protection is Called For—Company Installs Sleeping Quarters and Dining Room in Building—Meeting Held.

The first attempt at any disturbance or violence on the part of the striking telephone operators occurred Monday night, when six or eight of the operators out on the strike assembled in front of the telephone company's office in an effort to prevent the night force from going on duty.

A large crowd of men and boys gathered and lent the usual encouragement, according to the police. The police were called, and Sergeant Goodale and Officer Breckel were sent to the scene.

The demonstration of Monday night followed a meeting held in the afternoon between the strikers' grievance committee and Superintendent W. G. Howe. At this meeting nothing was accomplished, according to the superintendent.

The members of the strikers' grievance committee are Misses Edna Seeger, chairman; Esther Sheetz, and Gillian Perrin. In addition to the committee Miss Elizabeth O'Hearn, night telephone operator, met with the superintendent.

The grievance committee presented to the management of the telephone company Monday afternoon the wage schedule which the striking operators are demanding. The grievance committee says that Superintendent Howe refused to grant the increases.

The schedule of wages presented to the company by the strikers' grievance committee is as follows: A Class—Experience two or more years, \$35 per month.

ATTORNEY GENERAL IN FINE ADDRESS

BYERS TALKS ON "LAW ENFORCEMENT AND GOOD GOVERNMENT" AT ODEON.

ILLEGAL LIQUOR SALES ARE WORSE THAN THEFT

Byers Says That Selling Booze to Boys is Ten Thousand Times Greater Crime Than Stealing—Has Words of Praise for Cosson Removal Law—Compliments Short Course Work.

The address of Attorney General H. W. Byers, on "Law Enforcement," at the Odeon Monday night, was distinctively original and therefore refreshing. Mr. Byers demonstrated the fact that a great public problem can be discussed, and forcibly so, without rant or riddle, abuse, harrowing incidents, or tedious statistics.

Crime Should Starve to Death. In entering upon the discussion of the topic announced, "Law Enforcement and Good Government," Mr. Byers said it would seem that crime ought to starve to death in a community like this.

No Better City of Size Anywhere. In spite of all the good things we have, said Mr. Byers, we do not have the things that are justified in demanding. Practices are going on and being winked at in the cities and towns that corrupt the youth of the state, simply because the laws are not enforced.

Illegal Liquor Sales Worse Than Theft. In treating one phase of the laxity of enforcement Mr. Byers said the officials are neglecting their duty to take care of people's property and ignore laws that should protect the home, particularly the boys and girls. Children are compelled to pass by places that are openly violating the law on their way to the schools, where the observance of law is almost entirely absent.

Praises Cosson Removal Law. "Don't get the notion," said Mr. Byers, "that when the unlawful gambling places, saloons, and bawdy houses are cleaned out you have nothing else to do. You can smother corruption even when you enter the court house portals. We are not looking after our neighbors' boys enough. But we are going to have these things cleaned up. Even now the saloonkeepers are behaving themselves—as well as they can."

In Berlin, Paris, Vienna and other European cities there are now regular schools where the scientific care of the hair is made a special study and the character of these schools become so skilled in the knowledge of hair that they can tell merely by the touch whether it is in a healthy condition or not. They also know the effects of different tonics on different hair or different restoratives on the same hair.

Mr. Byers declared that no law ever written on the statute books of the state has done as much to correct abuses as the Cosson removal law, and the enforcement of this law and others is due to the fact that there is a "big stick" which somebody can use if necessary.


