VALUABLE PREMIUMS AWARDED BY JUDGES TO GROWERS OF BEST CORN SHOWN. E. B. GLENNEY, UNION, FARMER, A BIG WINNER. Fred McCulloch, of Hartwick; O. E. Stakland, of Dunbar; E. F. Goecke, of This City, Among the Larger Winners—Complete List of the Prize Winners of the Show.

A large sum in cash and valuable prizes of machinery, implements and merchandise, were awarded this afternoon for prizes won by the corn which has been exhibited in the court house during the short course this week. Professor P. G. Holden, finished judging the sweepstakes classes, which were the last to be passed upon, this afternoon.

The sweepstakes prizes were won by E. B. Glenney, of Union, for the best thirty ears of any kind of corn grown in or outside of the county. Fred McCulloch, of Hartwick, won the sweepstakes for the best twenty ears of corn grown in or outside of the county. O. E. Stakland, of Dunbar, won the sweepstakes for best ten ears of corn exhibited.

Some Large Prize Winners. Both E. B. Glenney, of Union, and Fred McCulloch, of Hartwick, were also among the large winners in other classes of the corn exhibit. The sweepstakes prizes range in value from \$100 to \$15.
