NEW CLUB'S HOME IN MASONIC TEMPLE

MARSHALLTOWN CLUB TO TAKE ENTIRE GROUND FLOOR AND MOST OF BASEMENT.

MANUFACTURERS TO INSTALL DISPLAYS

Club to Take Two Years' Lease on Quarters. With Option for Longer Period—Bowling Alley and Cafe Planned for Basement—Manufacturers Fall in With Plan.

A deal that has practically been closed between the executive committee of the Masonic Temple Association and the board of directors of the Marshalltown Club, will doubtless result in the signing of a lease for the entire main floor and a greater part of the basement, to be used by the Marshalltown Club as permanent quarters.

The club's prospective lease is for two years, with an option for three years more. The building will make beautiful and commodious quarters for the new club, and it is expected that the apartments will be finished and ready for occupancy by April 1.

In the basement there is being talked a bowling alley for amusement, and the club's cafe, where business men may go for their lunches.

In addition it may be found feasible and practical to open a small barber shop and shoe shining parlor in the club's quarters or in the basement, so that these conveniences may be close at hand.

Manufacturers Hit on Plan. A plan that originated with E. S. Ketchum, and suggested to a few of the manufacturers of the city, was directed by the club in the club deciding to take the quarters.

The rental for the first floor and basement of the building was too great for the club to shoulder, but by Mr. Ketchum's plan the club saw its way clear to assume the responsibility.

The plan advanced by Mr. Ketchum is that the manufacturers of the city take the south part of the main floor to be used as an exhibit hall. A partition seven feet high will be built, lengthwise of the building, with doors leading to the main exhibit room. On these doors will be shown the names of the manufacturers and their products. Visitors to the club, and especially strangers who may be interested in the manufacturing business done in the city, may enter the exhibit hall and there become acquainted with the character of the products made in Marshalltown. Some one will be placed in charge of the exhibit hall, and should there be some prospective purchaser for some line the main factory office interested may be summoned to send a representative to the exhibit hall.

On big days, when there are many strangers in the city, representatives of the different manufacturers would be at the exhibit hall all day, and meet customers from other towns or show their lines to merchants and jobbers.

Will Be Big Advertisement. The manufacturers who have been approached on the plan have fallen in line with much enthusiasm. The exhibit hall would be the source of a big advertisement to the manufactured articles of Marshalltown, and would make a down town office for every factory.

To the people of Marshalltown there is no doubt but that the exhibit hall would be a great revelation. For there are comparatively few people in Marshalltown who know many things they have been told about what Marshalltown makes, who have a very comprehensive idea as to the extensiveness of Marshalltown products.

Talking Railway Offices. Downtown railway offices is another feature planned by the club in connection with its rental of the Masonic Temple quarters. The idea is to have the railroads join in an office in the building, where railway tickets and sleeping car berths may be engaged over any line, and where freight bills may be paid by merchants without having to go to the depot district.

Building Nearly All Rented. The bulk of the available space in the new five-story Masonic Temple is now rented or spoken for. The Masonic lodge takes the entire fifth floor and the Marshalltown Club the first floor and basement. Of the remaining three floors one and one-half floors yet remain to be spoken for.

BUILDING FUND PROGRESSING. Salvation Army Has \$600 to Apply on Permanent Home Purchase.

Captain Moyer, of the Salvation Army, is pleased with the progress being made on the canvass for funds to be used in the purchase of the Bernheim building at 12 North First street for a permanent home for the army. Up to this morning \$600 had been subscribed.

It is the intention of the organization not to stop the canvass until \$3,000 has been pledged. The entire indebtedness contracted is \$5,500, and the army believes it can shoulder the remainder if a \$3,000 payment is made within sixty days.

MENINGITIS VICTIM

Infant Son of Mr. and Mrs. George Binson, Near State Center, Dies After Brief Illness, Before Serum Can Be Used to Counteract It.

A fatal case of cerebro spinal meningitis resulted near State Center Friday night, when the infant son of Mr. and Mrs. George Binson, four miles southwest of the town, died at 8 o'clock. The child was first seen by a physician Friday morning. The babe had been ill but a short time, and the physician's diagnosis was spinal fever. In order to make more positive on the diagnosis a physician from this city was sent for, and the Flexner serum was taken to State Center to be used in case the diagnosis was confirmed. The babe died, however, before the serum could be used.

Following the babe's death a spinal puncture was made and a specimen of the fluid was taken. Under examination the presence of the germs of cerebro spinal meningitis was found, confirming absolutely the cause of the babe's death. The victim of the disease was only 6 months old, and was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Binson.


Local Weather Record.
