Marshalltown Man Remarries Divorced
Wife at Waterloo.

Waterloo, Feb. 12.—Theron Hostet-
ter, aged 38, of Marshalltown, and
Eather Wolf, aged 54, of Cedar Falls,
were married here at 9 o'clock last
night by Justice Knapp, in the presence
of fifty curious onlookers. It is un-
derstood here that both had married
another before, but had been divorced,
and that Mrs. Hostetter had married
Wolf in the meantime and divorced
him.

The efforts of Hostetter and Mrs.
Wolf to get married are well known in
official circles here, and an application
for a license was refused by Clerk of
Courts F. M. Haradon, because the lat-
ter feared the bride had not been di-
vorced long enough from her hus-
band, George Hostetter, a brother of
the groom, filed a protest against the
marriage with the clerk of courts on
Jan. 29. Mrs. Wolf claimed to have
divorced Wolf a year ago last January.

Theron Hostetter, giving his age as
35, and Anna Holm Smith, then 18,
were married here March 16, 1907. The
bride at that time gave her marriage as
the third. Hostetter had been married
before and had been divorced in this
county on Oct. 14, 1905.
