ONLY THE HOLE LEFT

TREASURE OF \$40,000 CLAIMED TO BE BURIED ON FARM IS MISSING.

THREE STRANGERS WITH CHARTS CAUSE EXCITEMENT

Messrs. Rider and Fowler, of Lee County, Go Prospecting For Alleged Treasure With Trio of Wise Men From West, Who Act Mysteriously—Case is Puzzling.

Keokuk, Feb. 17.—Developments which are proving very interesting and which may lead to the discovery of a big three-handed plot to fleece a colored man by the name of George Fowler, living near the Des Moines bridge, out of a treasure fortune of \$40,000 turned up yesterday, when a neighbor of Fowler's, Henry Rider, who lives near the Fowler farm, was in the city and testified to the fact that he helped Fowler locate the place where the treasure was to have been found by the means of following three charts.

Rider says that several days ago Fowler came into possession of papers showing exactly the location of a treasure which was buried some twenty years ago, the two went out on the farm to locate the spot and by maneuvering and following instructions of the three charts, the exact spot was located, but instead of solid earth, a hole was found in the ground, a square cavity in which probably rested a box being found in the earth.

It was then that Fowler sought the services of the deputy U. S. marshal to see what could be done.

Three Men With Charts. It was only a short time ago that three men, two of whom said they hailed from Kansas and a third man from some place in Colorado, came to Fowler on his farm and produced plans showing where the treasure was buried. Just how these men came by the charts is not made very clear by Fowler and Rider, who are evidently much excited over the matter, as any one might be with a prospect of something like \$40,000 in view.

The three strangers with Fowler went out to the farm and they were shown where the place had been dug up. While putting up at one of the city hotels, the clerks say that the three watched a certain small suit which they had with them like hawks and did not once let it out of their sight, always keeping it with them.

There is something very mysterious about the buried treasure and Fowler is doing his best to see thru it all. Just why the hole in the ground and the box marks appeared there, he does not know. Why a certain Keokuk lawyer will not take his case, he does not know either. And where the three gentlemen from the west have gone to is not known any more than the coming of the end of the world.

EIGHTEEN EMERGE UNSCATHED.

None of Drake Football Squad Seriously Injured in Long Period.

Des Moines, Feb. 17.—Not one of the eighteen football players in Drake University said he would not play football again if he were to start in college next fall, according to statistics taken by Coach John L. Griffith in the first step of the investigation of the state's coaches into the dangers of football.

These eighteen men have played an average of four and a half years. Not one of the number has been seriously injured during their period of play and not one has been incapacitated for his life work. In fact all of them believe they have been greatly benefited by the game. Ten of the eighteen said they thought basketball was the roughest of college sports. Six of them gave the palm to baseball. Two stated that one is as rough as the other.
