MABRAYITES IN STAMPEDE TO GET THE EAR OF THE COURT AT COUNCIL BLUFFS.

FEDERAL OFFICIALS ON HAND TO AID IN CONDUCTING TRIALS

Postoffice Employee From South Bend, Ind., Present to Give Evidence Against Herriman, Brown and Moore — One of South Bend Branch of Gang Now Doing Time—Other Iowa News.

Council Bluffs, March 9.—It is quietly intimated that since the publication of the story that Mabray and others of his alleged associates are to plead guilty to the charges in United States district court, of swindling by means of fake horse races, fake wrestling matches, etc., others of the accused have been "falling over themselves" to get the ear of the court in a tentative way with the view of pleading guilty. An official of the federal government is authority for this statement. Postoffice Inspector Swenson, Ranger and Almon, of Council Bluffs, St. Louis and Sioux City, are here assisting in preparing for trial.

An interesting personage here ready to go upon the witness stand for the side of the government in these cases, is J. H. Alward of South Bend, Ind., a box clerk in the postoffice of that city. His testimony will have special reference to the operations of a branch "store" which, it is claimed, was operated in South Bend in the spring of 1905 by R. B. Herriman, Frank W. Brown and Ed C. Moore, after the trial had separated from Mabray in New Orleans.

Alward's testimony will show, says one of the postoffice inspectors who was interviewed by our correspondent, that Herriman, Brown and Moore had a letter box at South Bend, and that they dispatched and received a large amount of mail. The trio had been associated with Mabray. It is claimed, in swindles pulled off in the southern metropolis. Their operations there included some of the heaviest deals in the history of the syndicate, one of their victims being J. E. Cavanaugh, who is now in jail.

One of the circumstances of the accident, if accident it was, is known in Waterloo. The telegram advising the relatives of the death simply stated that an inquest had been held and that the body had been taken in charge by the Eagles.
