U. S. COURT HALTS CONTEMPT CASES

FEDERAL COURT ISSUES RESTRAINING ORDER AGAINST COUNTY ATTORNEY.

IS ORDERED NOT TO PROCEED IN CASES

County Attorney, Clerk of Courts and Sheriff Ordered Not to Take Any Further Steps in Contempt Cases Until Hearing on Restraining Order is Had on April 4.

A new move—one from the saloonists—was sprung in the local liquor cases this afternoon when restraining orders, issued by Judge Smith McPherson, of the federal court at Des Moines, were served on County Attorney J. H. Egermayer, Sheriff A. A. Nicholson, and Clerk of Courts F. M. Haradon.

The order restrains the officials named from any further procedure in the contempt cases against the three Gifford saloons, or any of the employes of the three places. The county attorney, sheriff, and clerk are summoned to appear in the federal court on April 4 to answer the complaints filed.

Will Tie Up Cases. This move on the part of the saloon attorneys will tie up the contempt cases at least thru the March term of the district court, when these cases would probably have been heard. The notices served here by Deputy United States Marshal H. H. Bidwell this afternoon give the following as the complainants, upon whose allegations the restraining orders were issued: F. H. Gifford, Phoebe E. Gifford, John Kelley, Oscar Fosse, Charles Clifford, Carl Schmitz, George Hiser, Theodore Johnson, Owen T. Bartley, Frank Edwards, Frank A. McComber, Henry Thede, and Edward Plunkett.

Ties Officials' Hands. The effect of the restraining orders is that it ties the hands of the county attorney, at least temporarily. The order directs him and the other officials against whom it is issued to refrain from enforcing or attempting to enforce, proceeding against, or arresting or imprisoning or in any way proceeding against the complainants named. There are certain peculiarities about the order. One of these is that insofar as Henry Thede and Frank A. McComber are concerned no proceedings have yet been begun against them by the county attorney.


