W. F. TREADWELL
DIES AT FAIRBANK

FORMER WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT
OF THIS CITY FOUND DEAD
IN BED.
WAS FORMERLY COUNTY
TREASURER OF MARSHALLTOWN.

Mr. Treadwell Served Three Terms in Office, and Was Deputy For Four Years Preceding—Body to Be Buried Here—Injury Causes Death at LeGrand—Other Deaths.

William F. Treadwell, a former well-known citizen of Marshalltown, and for six years treasurer of this county, died suddenly at Fairbank, early this morning. Death was due to cerebral hemorrhage, and Mr. Treadwell's dead body was found when his wife arose this morning. It is believed that the end must have come at about 4 o'clock.

Mr. Treadwell was well known in the town of Fairbank, which is in Buchanan county, where he was president of the Fairbank State Bank, being associated with George W. McNeely, of this city.

Sketch of Career.
William Franklin Treadwell was a native of Adrian, Mich., and was born Nov. 23, 1844. He was married at South Bend, Ind., in 1866, his bride being Miss Ardepha Moore, who survives him.

Mr. Treadwell came to this city in 1865, and entered the employ of A. Louis, a clothier, who was then conducting a store at 4 East Main street, one of the rooms now occupied as a public store room by Harry Rappaport. Mr. Treadwell worked for Mr. Louis about sixteen years, or until 1881, when he became deputy county treasurer under Gen. B. A. Beeson. He served as Mr. Beeson's deputy four years, and upon being a candidate to succeed Beeson, was elected and served three terms, or six years. Mr. Treadwell left Marshalltown in 1891, when he went to Fairbank and organized the bank of which he was president at the time of his death.

Charter Member of K. of P.
Mr. Treadwell was a charter member of Cosmopolitan Lodge, No. 38, Knights of Pythias, of this city, and held his membership here. He also retained his membership in the local Odd Fellows lodge, and was a former member of the Masonic fraternity here. His membership in this organization at the time of his death, however, was in Fairbank. Mr. Treadwell was a member of the First Presbyterian church of this city.

Aside from his wife Mr. Treadwell is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Etta Agnew, of Fairbank, and Mrs. Harry Gehart, of this city. One brother, Royal H. Treadwell, of Parker, S. D., also survives him.

Body Buried Here.
The funeral of Mr. Treadwell was held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at Fairbank. The body will be brought here for burial, which will take place in Riverside directly upon the arrival of the forenoon train Tuesday on the Chicago Great Western from the north, which is due at 10:25. Rev. James Rayburn will have charge of a brief prayer service at the grave.

INJURY CAUSES DEATH.
Frank Wolfe, of LeGrand, Succumbs to Accident of Three Weeks Ago.
Frank Wolf, a signal man employed by the Chicago & Northwestern railway at LeGrand, and a son of Mrs. Warren Eaton, of Lamolle, died at his home Sunday night at 10 o'clock of peritonitis and pneumonia, both of which resulted from a fall from a signal tower, sustained three weeks ago.

Mr. Wolf slipped while on the ladder, and in falling caught one of the rungs of the ladder. He strained himself severely, and the peritonitis and pneumonia both followed as a result.

Frank Wolf was born at Quarry, Jan. 26, 1888, and has spent his entire life in the county. He was married last summer to Mrs. Mary B. Wolf, and aside from his wife and his mother, leaves a baby son 4 weeks old.

The funeral will be held from the Congregational church at Lamolle, Rev. E. B. Miller, of the Lamolle Congregational church, officiating. Interment will follow in the Lamolle cemetery.

OLD DILLON RESIDENT.
Mrs. John B. Brush Dies Following Two Weeks' Illness.
Mrs. John B. Brush, aged 66 years, an old resident of the county who lived for many years in Dillon, died at her home, 424 Swayze street, at 4:45 o'clock Sunday morning of catarrhal pneumonia. Mrs. Brush had been sick for two weeks. Mrs. Brush had lived in the county since 1851. The last eleven years of that time has been spent in this city. Prior to moving here Mr. and Mrs. Brush lived in Dillon for fifteen years.

Mrs. Brush was born in Clay county, Indiana, Feb. 15, 1844. She became the wife of John B. Brush in 1864, the wedding taking place in this county. In addition to the husband Mrs. Brush is survived by one son, H. E. Brush, of this city. Two other sons and two daughters are dead. She is also survived by one brother, V. W. Reimer, and two sisters, Mrs. O. W. Brush and Mrs. O. R. Wilson, both of this city. They are visiting at present in San Pedro, Cal.

The funeral will be held from the residence Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, Rev. S. E. Ellis officiating. Interment will be in the Rock Valley cemetery.

EDWARD KILAEE DEAD.
Old-Time Employee of Iowa Central Dies at St. Thomas.
Edward D. Kilaee, 711 Bromley street, an old-time employee of the Iowa Central, where he worked continuously for eighteen years, died at St. Thomas hospital at 11 o'clock Sunday forenoon as the result of prostatic trouble and blood poisoning. Mr. Kilaee had been ill for several days, and was taken to the hospital for treatment last week.
