MARSHALLTOWN CLUB TAKES STEPS TO ENTERTAIN IOWA MANUFACTURERS.

CONVENTION MEETS IN THIS CITY JUNE 8 AND 9

It is Expected That 400 or 500 Members of the Association Will Attend—Association Makes Its Plans For Convention — Details of Arrangements With Standing Committees.

Steps were taken at the weekly meeting of the directors of the Marshalltown Club, held Saturday night, to prepare plans for handling the eighth annual convention of the Iowa State Manufacturers' Association, which is to be held in this city on June 8 and 9. The details of the plans for the convention are to be arranged by the club's standing committees on conventions, entertainments and jobbers and manufacturers.

The work will be subdivided among these committees so that the Iowa manufacturers who attend may be given a royal welcome. It is expected that 400 or 500 will attend.

Prepares For Convention. Initial steps in preparation for the convention have been taken by the association, according to notices which have been sent out by C. A. Wrightman, of Des Moines, secretary of the association.

The convention will open at 9 o'clock on the morning of Wednesday, June 8, and will close with a banquet on the day following.

Among the questions to be taken up for discussion during the session of the convention are: State regulation of public utilities, a state tax commission, insurance laws, a state fire marshal, the regulation of merchandise sales in bulk, the reform of judicial procedure, industrial education, road improvement, a machinery building at the state fair, the Iowa railroad commission, reciprocal denurrage, and Iowa capital for Iowa industries.

Deemer and Byers to Speak. At the banquet, to be held on the evening of Thursday, Judge Horace E. Deemer, of the supreme court of Iowa, and Attorney General Howard W. Byers will be the principal speakers. Their subjects have not yet been announced.

Secretary Wrightman is making an effort to get a large attendance and the association is contemplating running special trains from Keokuk and Des Moines, which will pick up members en route and special cars from Dubuque, Clinton, Burlington, Sioux City, Fort Dodge, and Council Bluffs. The officers of the association are: President, Dillon T. Toney, Fairfield; Vice president, J. M. Denning, Cedar Rapids; treasurer, S. W. Mercer, Iowa City; and secretary, G. A. Wrightman, Des Moines. E. H. Draper, of this city, traffic manager for the Western Grocer Company, is a member of the executive committee.

HENNEBERRY WINS SUIT. Echo of Toler Case in Wright County District Court.

According to advices to the Times-Republican from Eagle Grove, J. W. Henneberry, a leading attorney of that city, has just been awarded a judgment in the Wright county district court, sitting at Clarion, in a suit brought for \$1,000 and the judgment rendered was in the sum of \$928.98.

The suit over the claim for attorney's fees is an echo of the Toler murder case, C. M. Toler, who was employed as a round house foreman during the Iowa Central strike, was accused by a party of strikers on South Third avenue, and during the melee that resulted Toler shot and killed George W. Davies, one of his assailants. The railroad company, which defended Toler, employed the late Senator Tom Henly, of Fort Dodge, to handle the case. Mr. Henly employed Mr. Henneberry to assist him, but the railroad company refused to allow the claim filed by Mr. Henneberry for his work in the case in looking up evidence. The case was tried before Judge Wright.

"The Servant in the House" Proves Dramatic Treat of High Order.

Marshalltown theatergoers saw for the first time here Saturday night the dramatization of Charles Rann Kennedy's novel, "The Servant in the House," which proved a dramatic treat of high order.

Henry Miller's associate players, forming an aggregation without a weak spot, appeared at the Odeon in this famous play before an audience that was unusually large for a Saturday night.

"The Servant in the House" is a most remarkable play. It deals with the church and the clergy, and at the same time is an absorbing story of the human interest type. It is unusual in that it is tragic yet not a tragedy; a modern comedy, and yet not funny. It tells the story of five people whom, thru misunderstanding of the relations of love to life, are being drawn apart. A minister of God's church and his wife have taken the former's niece, Mary, to rear when the girl's mother dies and her father becomes a drunkard. Rev. William Smyth, the vicar, to please his wife, who aspires to a bigger and broader field for her husband's usefulness, has kept the girl Mary in ignorance of her father—the vicar's brother—Mary longs for a parent's love. The vicar, with unrest in his soul and conscience tricken because he believes that, had he done his full duty, his lost brother might be returned to God's fold, finally decides to tell Mary who her father is, and to once more recognize Robert Smith as his flesh and blood, regardless of his low station in life—a cleaner of drains.

The part of a scheming bishop—the personification of the hypocrite—is also shown during the story of the play, when James Fosberry Makeshy is introduced. He is the brother of the vicar's wife, and the wife would have his aid in building a new church. The

Three Stars of "The Goddess of Liberty"



Miss Sallie Fisher, the prima donna of "The Goddess of Liberty" Company, which is to appear at the Odeon tomorrow night, is said to be the highest salaried prima donna appearing in musical comedy before the American theater going public today.

Miss Fisher's support is of the very best, and contains practically an all-

Witnessing the difficult situation that confronts the household is a humble butler—Manson—who, in reality, is Joshua Smith, a churchman of India, who has returned after many years' absence during which time he has been given up as dead by his brother, William Smyth, the vicar, and Robert Smith, the drain man. Manson's tact is used to good advantage in bringing order out of chaos, sunshine and love out of darkness, and he finally succeeds in uniting father and daughter, husband and wife, and brother and brother.

Howard Kyle appeared in a most artistic interpretation of Manson, the butler—gentle of spirit, yet firm in conviction. Mr. Kyle possesses a voice that is peculiarly adapted to a character of this kind, and is gentleness itself. His lines describing the living church proved one of the literary gems of the dialog.

The difficult character of the drain man was in the hands of Frank Mills. This character admits of much dramatic expression, and was very ably presented by Mr. Mills.

Lizzie Hudson, Miller essayed the role of the vicar's wife to good advantage, and George Irving appeared as the vicar. A very brilliant piece of character work was that of the scheming bishop, given by John Westley. Edith Spears, as Mary, was also very good, and especially so when it is considered work interesting when it is considered a page boy, given by Henry Travers. Minor as this character is, Mr. Travers gives a decidedly clever impersonation of the cockney page.

Mr. Miller's company in "The Servant in the House" is a band of New York players who seldom get this far west in any of their appearances. Illness and death have resulted in a reorganization during recent weeks. Clayton Clarke, who had the character of Manson, was compelled to retire two weeks ago, and was succeeded by Mr. Kyle. Clay Clement's death at Kansas City made Mr. Mills a member of the cast as the drain man.


