

JOE CANNON WHIPPED NORRIS WINS FIGHT

Complete Victory For Insurgent Republicans Foreseen in Test Vote to Table Norris Resolution.

ANTI-CANNON FORCES SHOW BIG INCREASE IN STRENGTH

Speaker Finally Rules Norris Resolution Out of Order and Decision is Appealed From—Cannonites Attempt to Table Appeal and Lose by Vote of 181 to 164—Efforts at Compromise Fail and War to a Finish is Declared—Speaker's Forces Admitted They Were Beaten When House Reconvened—Story of the Great Parliamentary Battle.

WASHINGTON, MARCH 11.—THE NORRIS SUBSTITUTE FOR THE ELECTION OF THE RULES COMMITTEE BY THE HOUSE AND THE ENLARGING OF THE COMMITTEE TO TEN MEMBERS WAS ADOPTED LATE THIS AFTERNOON BY A VOTE OF 193 TO 153. THIS RESOLUTION ELIMINATES THE SPEAKER FROM THE COMMITTEE.

INSURGENTS WIN ON TEST VOTE

Cannon Rules Norris Resolution Out of Order, House Fails to Sustain. Washington, March 19.—The house met at noon, and when Cannon mounted the rostrum he was greeted with wild cheering on the republican side.

At 12:42 Norris appealed from the speaker's ruling and Daisel moved to lay the appeal on the table. The roll was called, and the house rejected Daisel's motion to lay the Norris appeal on the table.

The house sustained the appeal from the speaker's ruling, by a decisive vote of 182 to 160, and Cannon was thus overruled.

Washington, March 19.—With the warring factions apparently determined to fight out to the bitter end the contest precipitated by the resolution to increase the membership of the committee on rules and drop therefrom the speaker, the house reassembled at noon today.

Conference Comes to Naught. An hour before the house was to meet the conference of representatives of the regular and insurgent republicans, which had been in session nearly two hours, broke up without reaching an agreement.

Insurgents—Norris, of Nebraska; Gardner, of Massachusetts; Hayes, of California, and Lenroot, of Wisconsin. Martin, of South Dakota, was in the conference room as a harmonizing influence.

Cannon Cool When Beaten. The announcement was greeted with applause by the opposition, but Cannon gave no outward indication of his feelings.

urged Norris to withdraw his motion. The democrats and insurgents united in shouts of protest and Norris refused to withdraw the motion.

Insist on Speaker's Elimination. Today's conference, as did that held yesterday afternoon, failed because the regulars refused to consent to the elimination of the speaker from the rules committee.

Cannon's Lieutenants Firm. Martin's suggestion of a compromise included a proviso that the new committee should select its own chairman.

Mann Admits Defeat. The regulars walked slowly to Speaker Cannon's room a few feet distant. Their mien was as solemn and determined as that of the insurgents.

How Cannon Went to Defeat. The cheering which greeted Cannon as he assumed the chair was confined almost entirely to his adherents on the floor.

Biggest Fight in Years. No such series of scenes have been witnessed in a congress in recent years. The performance evoked every emotion from the serio-tragic effort to wrest from the speaker the chief source of his power to the songs, jokes and jests that the members bandied during the long hours of vigil.

Twenty-Five Insurgents. The following insurgent republicans voted with the democrats against the motion to table the Norris appeal.
