

CENTRAL FIREMEN GRANTED INCREASE

SCHEDULE WHICH SLIGHTLY RAISES RATE OF PAY SIGNED BY GENERAL MANAGER.

BECAME EFFECTIVE APRIL 1 FOR PERIOD ONE YEAR

Schedule is Satisfactorily Arranged by General Manager and Firemen's Committee—Scale of Increase Varies According to Type of Engines and Character of Work Done by Firemen

Locomotive firemen of the Iowa Central will receive more pay for their work as a result of the conference the committee of the men had with General Manager W. G. Bied in Oskaloosa. The schedule, which was completed Saturday afternoon, became effective on April 1.

Slight increases in pay, and a few minor changes in the rules governing their work, were made in the schedule. The schedule of wages differs for different classes of engines and for different kinds of work, such as firing locomotives on the main line, branch line work, switching, and work done at terminals. The schedule is for a period of a year.

General Manager Bied and the committee were at work on the schedule for three days. Mr. Bied was in the city for a short time Saturday evening while on his way to Minneapolis.

GILMAN MAN DEAD.

Benjamin D. Sult Dies at Iowa City Hospital of Tuberculosis. Benjamin D. Sult, of Gilman, who had also lived in Jasper county and Grundy County, died at the university hospital at Iowa City, where he had been taken for an examination, at 11:30 Sunday morning of tuberculosis of the spine. He had suffered with the disease for a number of years. The body was brought to Gilman Sunday night, and the funeral will probably be held Tuesday.

Benjamin Dorr Sult was born in Jasper county, Dec. 27, 1877. He continued to live on his farm where he was born until he married Miss Jessie L. Plumbeck on March 19, 1902. Soon after his marriage an injury to the knee made it necessary to amputate one leg in order that his life might be saved.

In 1894 Mr. and Mrs. Sult moved to Grundy County, where they lived for a year, then moved to Gilman. About six years ago he underwent an operation for his spine in this city, which gave temporary relief. His health, during the past year, had failed gradually, and ten days ago he was taken to the Iowa City hospital.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Donphan, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sult, and the following brothers and sisters: Dr. F. W. Sult and Mrs. J. E. Darran, of Gilman; Mrs. A. B. Clark, of Independence, Mo.; and C. L. Sult, of San Antonio, Tex.

A movement to organize the preachers of the county into an association was started at the monthly meeting of the Marshalltown Pastors' Association, held at the Methodist church this morning. Invitations are to be sent to all of the preachers of the county, to meet with the local association in this city on Monday, May 2.

A committee, consisting of Revs. S. E. Ellis and James Rayburn, and Henry E. Wilson, was appointed to prepare a program for the first meeting, when it is expected that the organization will be perfected.

The purpose of the organization is to furnish means of bringing the preachers of the county together periodically for an interchange of ideas in church and other work.

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
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
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
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
